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Weldon Hatchery Ready To Operate

The rockfish hatchery at Weldon, N. C., the only one of its kind in the world, is standing by to hatch rockfish eggs as soon as the fish themselves cooperate by running up the Roanoke River.

According to an announcement by the Department of Conservation and Development and the Wildlife Resources Commission, the hatchery will be operated jointly by the two departments with assistance from the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service.

Plans call for 24 hour daily operation of the hatchery on three-

eight-hour shifts. Eggs will be furnished by fishermen who bring in spawners to be stripped of egg and milt. Fishermen will be paid for the eggs at the rate of \$10 per million. The hatchery itself is owned by the City of Weldon.

The total number of rockfish eggs hatched this year will depend upon the number of mature female fish caught, and cooperation from fishermen in bringing these fish in to the hatchery for stripping.

15 Tons Of Trout To Stock Streams

About fifteen tons of trout, including brook, brown and rainbow, will have been stocked in North Carolina's public trout waters by the time trout season closes this year, according to

Clyde P. Patton, executive director of the North Carolina Wildlife Resources Commission.

All trout produced and released by the Commission's hatcheries this year have gone into waters open to public fishing, thus giving a greater number of fishing license buyers a chance to benefit from the operation of

the State's hatcheries. No trout have been sold to individuals or private concerns this year.

In addition to the usual stocking, several thousand small fingerlings are to be stocked in head waters of streams where trout spawn in an attempt to provide more "wild" fish for all anglers in future years.

Beth-Ware Nine Tied For Top Spot

Beth-Ware high school baseball team is set to tangle with the Lattimore high entry in a county loop game at Lattimore Friday before taking next week off.

No loop games are scheduled for the team during the week beginning on Monday.

Next carded game sends Coach John Rudisill's nine to Number 3 high school on May 9th for a chance to even that series at one-all. No. 3 handed the Beth-Ware team it's only defeat in loop play on April 14 by a 3-0 score.

Boiling Springs is set to play at Beth-Ware on May 12th in the final loop game before the annual county baseball tournament.

Beth-Ware is now tied with No. 3 for the top spot in the south zone, after Tuesday's game which saw Boiling Springs knock the Earl team out of the undefeated ranks.
