Resolution

The following resolution presented to the Board of Commissioners of the City of Kings Mountain at its regular meeting held on the 10th day of May, 1950, upon motion of Commissioner A. H. Patterson and seconded by Commissioner C. F. Mauney, was unanimously adopted:

Whereas, a part of Dilling Street beginning at the intersection of Dilling Street with Parker Street and extending thence Northwesterly to Phenix Street near the Burlington Mill and all of Wells Street beginning at the intersection of Wells Street with Highway No. 29 and running thence Easterly to the end of said street are in a bad state of repair and in certain seasons of the year unsuited and unfit for the accommodation of the traveling public; and whereas, a majority in number of the owners who represent a majority of all the lineal feet of frontage of the lands or lots abutting on said streets, have petitioned the Mayor and the Board of Commissioners of the City of Kings Mountain requesting that paving and the improving of said streets according to the provisions of Chapter 56 of the Public Laws of North Carolina, Session of 1915 now C. S. Section 160-83 as appears from said petition and the certificate of the Clerk of the Board of Commissioners of the City of Kings Mountain;

And whereas, the necessities for said improvement are apparent and are necessary for the best interest of the City of Kings Mountain and the traveling public;

THEREFORE, be it resolved and ordered by the Board of Commissioners of the City of Kings Mountain that said petitions fully comply with G. S. 160-83 and are determined to be sufficient under the law aforesaid and be it further resolved and ordered that a part of Dilling Street beginning at the intersection of Dilling Street with Parker Street and extending Northwesterly to Phenix Street near the Burlington Mill and all of Wells Street beginning at the intersection of Wells Street with State Highway No. 29 and running thence Easterly to the end of said street, be paved with a standard quality of pavement, the exact character to be hereinafter determined and two-thirds of the total cost thereof, exclusive of the cost of the work at the intersections, be assessed upon the abutting property owners, as follows:

That the property owners on the East side of Dilling Street proposed to be paved shall pay one-third of the total cost of said improvement and the property owners on the West side of Dilling Street shall pay one-third of the total cost of said improvement; and the property owners on the North side of Wells Street shall pay one-third of the total cost of said improvement;

That the property owners pro-rata part of said improvement shall be due and payable to the City of Kings Mountain within sixty days from the date of confirmation of the assessment roll.

It is further ordered that the Clerk be required to cause a copy of this resolution to be published as required by law.

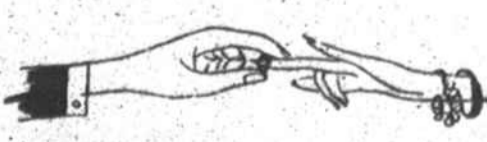

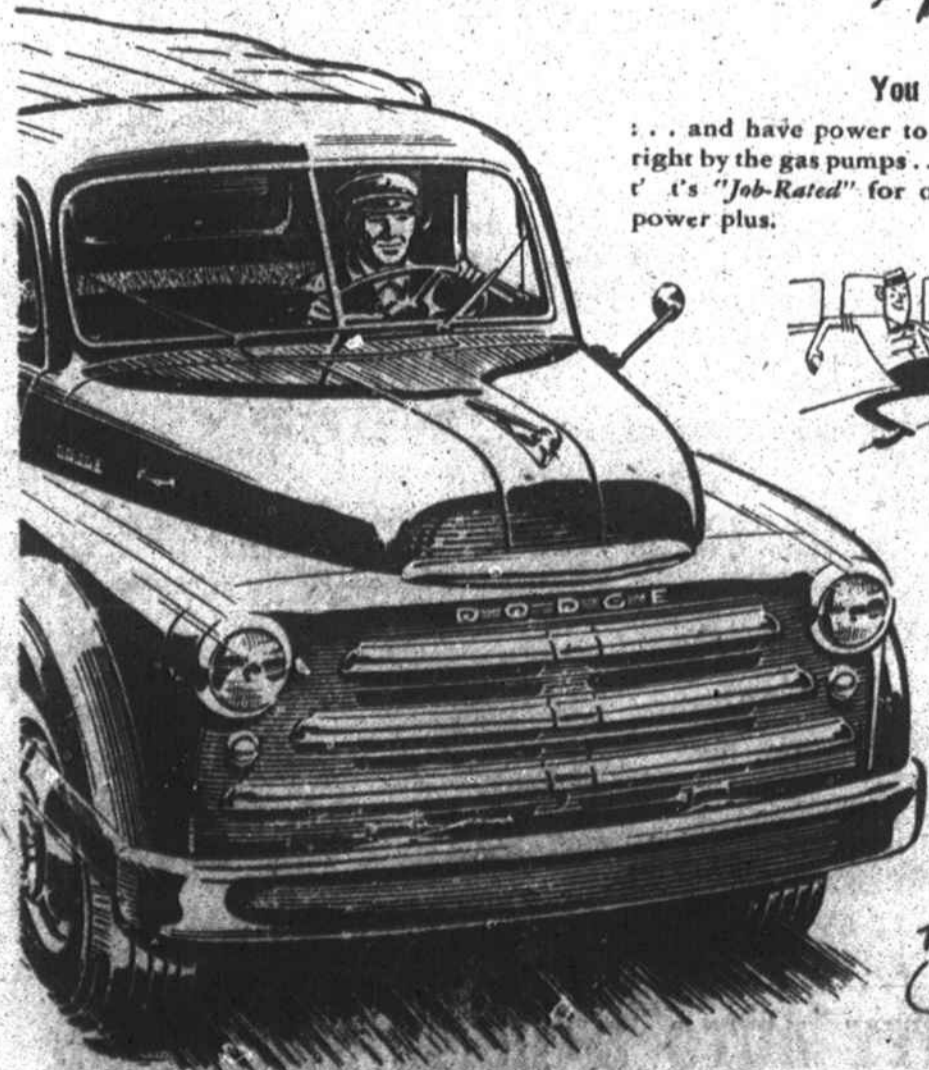
