Meeting Set Sunday By Lutheran Group

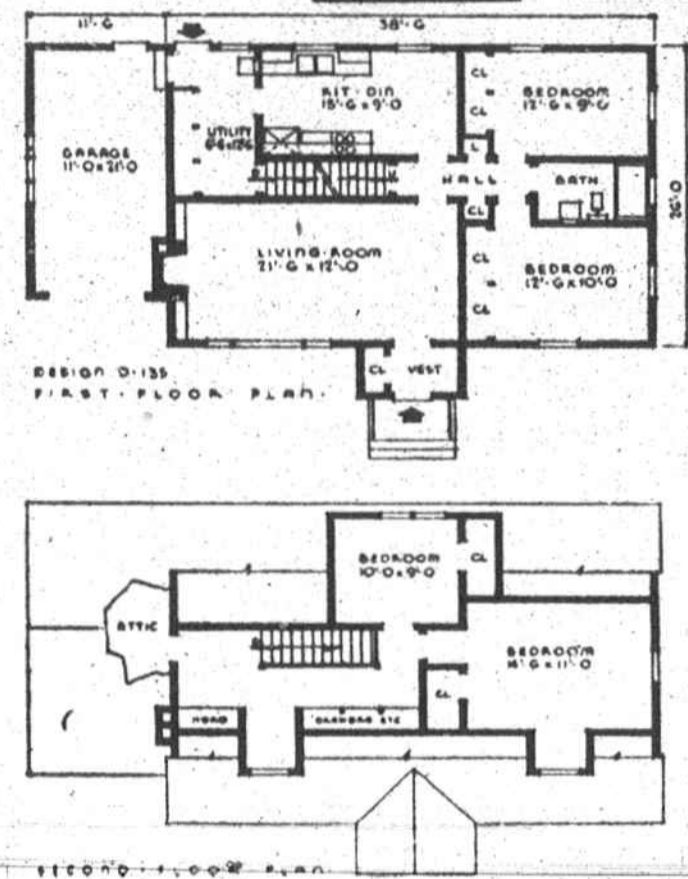
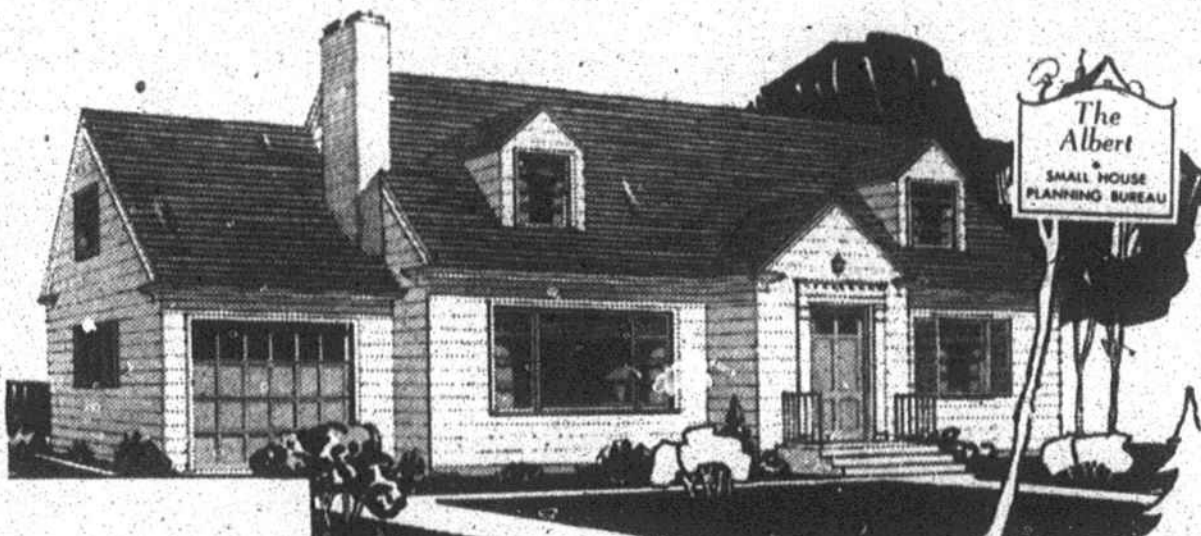
A Life Service Institute, sponsored by the Women of the Church, for all the young people of St. Matthew's Lutheran church will be held on Sunday afternoon May 21, beginning at 4 p. m.

The leaders for this occasion will be Sister Miriam Shirey and the Reverend V. F. Frazier. Sister Miriam is the deaconess for the Social Missions Society of Columbia, S. C., and Mr. Frazier is pastor of the St. Stephen's Lutheran church, Lexington, S. C.

The speakers will present the cause of Life Service, both full time and part time, and will lead in the discussions with the groups. During the afternoon Mr. Frazier will use approved tests and give the young people an opportunity to rate themselves in nine different vocations. Then each person will interpret the test for himself. The leaders will show

filmstrips during the discussion groups, and discuss with the young people the cause of the Ministry and the Diaconate as a choice for lifetime work.

At 6:15 p. m., supper will be served by the Women of the Church in the dining room. At 7:30 p. m. the Luther Leagues will present their annual Life Service Program. Both Sister Miriam and Pastor Frazier will speak. "All young people are urged to be present for the institute and are urged to invite their friends to worship with us," Rev. W. L. Stender said in making the announcement.



THE ALBERT, a story and a half Cape Cod house, has four bedrooms and attached garage. The wide siding and asphalt shingled exterior has a wide dormer in rear and two smaller dormers in front for cross ventilation. Colonial trimmed vestibule entrance has wrought iron railings.

First floor bedrooms have wardrobe type closets with overhead storage space. Second floor rooms have walk-in type. Linen closets are located in bathroom hall and a large storage cabinet and closet in second floor hall.

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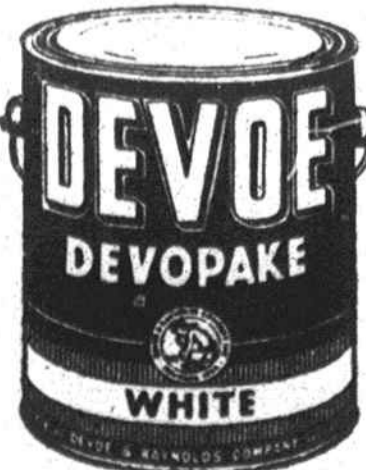
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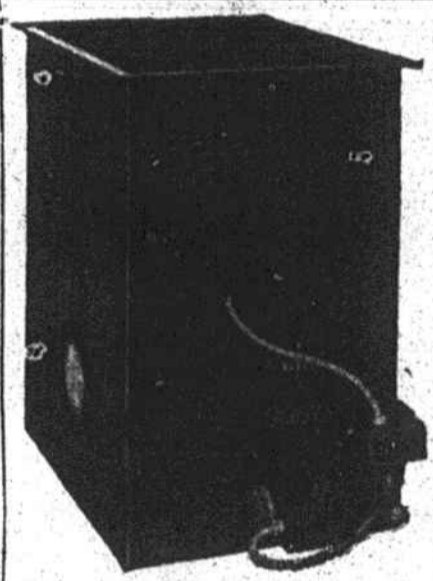
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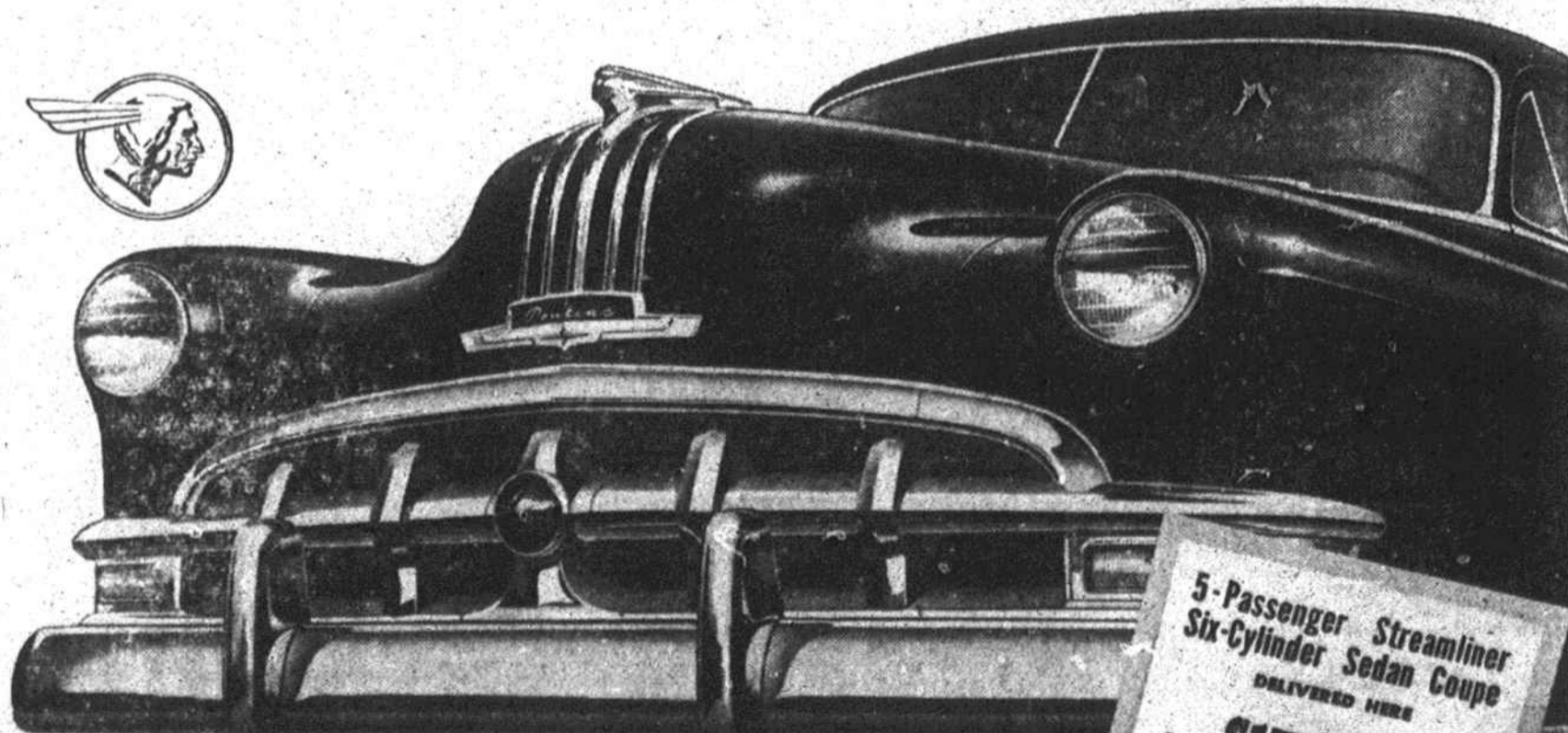
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
