## SOCIAL SECURITY NOTES

In August 1949—the latest month for which official figures are available—more than 2,600,000 Americans were receiving Social Security benefits in excess of \$33,000,000 monthly. But our aim is to see that every person eligible for benefits files a claim promptly and is promptly paid. There are, however, thousands of widows, orphans, and men and women past 65 who, through ignorance of their rights, are failing to collect money due them.

One of the most common reasons for loss of benefits is the belief that a person must be in need before he can get benefits. Outside means or income in no way affects the right to payment under the old-age and survivors insurance program. Such benefits are based upon payment which the worker and his employer make to the government in cash. Excepting that it is deducted from the worker's paycheck, it is exactly the same as a cash payment on a private insurance policy. In fact, it is a form of insurance.

The Social Security Administration has more than 500 field offices and maintains thousands of itinerant stations in smaller communities which anyone may visit or write to learn about his social security rights.

Field Representatives go to the greatest lengths to locate claimants. They enlist the aid of private insurance people, employers, fraternal orders, church organizations, and funeral directors to help locate people with claims.

In conclusion, let me offer the following advice to everyone: If you have any questions about your rights or those of your family, if you are nearing the age 65 whether you intend to retire or not; if the wage earner in

your family dies, go to the nearest Social Security office as soon as possible, or write to that office. It may mean money in your pocket.

The office serving Gaston, Cleveland and Lincoln Counties is located in the Post Office Building in Gastonia, telephone number 5-4611. Office hours are from 9 a. m. to 5 p. m. Monday through Friday.

Regular trips are made to Kings Mountain to the City Hall on the 1st and 3rd Wednesday of every month at 10 a. m.
