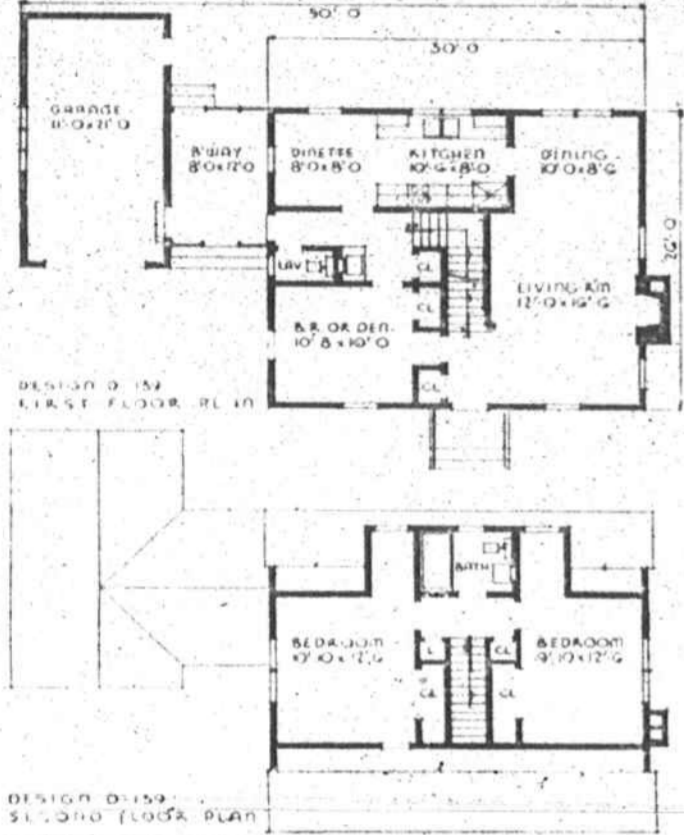
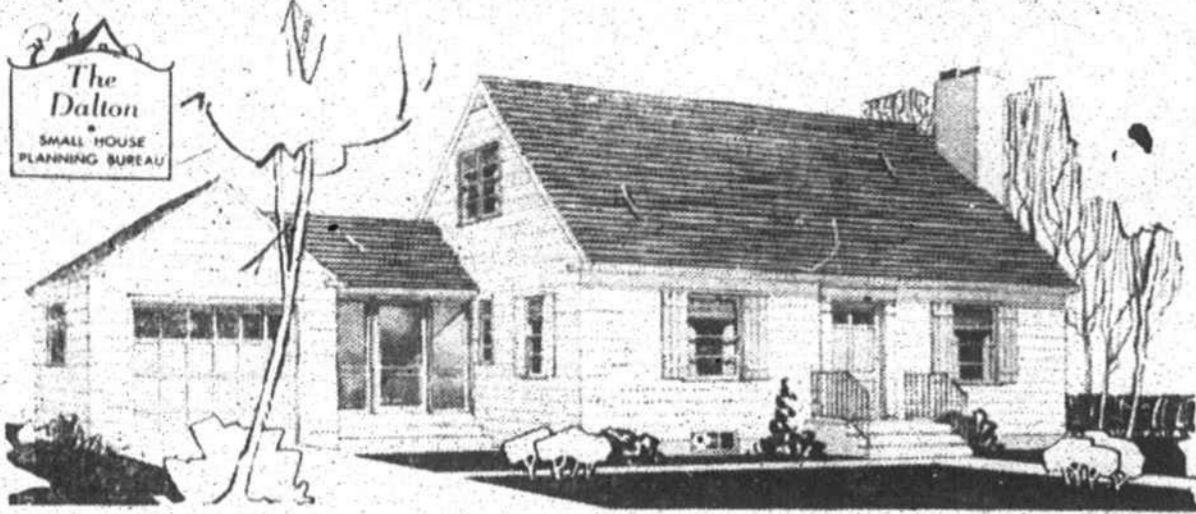


Herald "House-of-the-Week"



THE DALTON has several features of unusual interest. The principal bedrooms are on the second floor and have cross ventilation. One room on the first floor can be converted to several uses, such as a third bedroom, an office or a den. It is within easy reach of both entrances and the first floor toilet.

The side entrance is a little larger than usual, but it serves as a clean up room and has both coat closet and lavatory.

The living room and the dining room are combined. However, a dinette is included in with the kitchen.

The closet space is ample for ordinary needs. Planning has been concentrated especially on the location of the closets to provide for convenient distribution and excellent circulation.

Exterior finish is siding and asphalt shingles.

Dimensions are 30 feet by 26 feet, floor area 780 square feet and cubage 171,940, not including garage.
