Utilities Body Engineer Replies To Complaints

It is the opinion of V. W. Chase elephone engineer for the North 'arolina Utilities commission, that the Southern Bell telephone exchange here has facilities "for providing a good class of tele phone service" and he doubts that Kings Mountain would find dial service much better than the manual service now in operation.

These opinions Mr. Chase expressed in a letter to W. Faison Barnes, secretary of the Kings Mountain Merchants association, and made public by Mr. Barnes. The Merchants Association, in opposing a request by Southern Bell for rate increases here, has complained of deficient service and in turn, asked for installation of dial equipment.

It was the feeling of the merchants' group that certain feaures of the manually - operatedequipment prevent an improvement in the service.
