### Mountaineers Play Hill Toppers Here Friday Night In Loop Contest

Kings Mountain high school is scheduled to face Rutherfordton-Spindale high school Hill Toppers here in City Stadium Friday night in a Western (AA) Conference game, next to last home game on the 1950 Mountaineer card. Game time is 7:30 p. m.

The T-formation Hill Toppers boast a strong team, reportedly as strong as the 1949 squad which trimmed Kings Mountain by a score of 20 to 6.

However, to date the Rutherfordton-Spindale eleven has posted no conference victories. The loop record reads no wins, one loss (to Hickory) and one tie (Shelby).

Last Friday night the Hill Toppers spanked Tryon by a score of 26 to 0 and may have hit their stride.

Injuries have hurt the Hill Toppers this season according to reports. Guard Richard Davis, who has been billed as one of the best high school linemen in the state and sure-fire Shrine Bowl material by the Rutherfordton press, has been handicapped by a leg injury to date.

The Hill Topper attack is sparked by Quarterback Bill McClure, Right Halfback Raymond Lyles, Left Halfback Joe Helms and Fullback Junior Melton in the backfield.

Up front with Captain Davis the Hill Toppers boast a heavy line. Clifford Carpenter is at the other guard post, Charles Freeman and Donald Givens are at tackles, Bob Hardin is at center, and Herbert Koon and Herman Dixon man the flanks.

C. N. Womack is the coach. Kings Mountain came through the 7-2 win over Forest City last Friday night in fairly good shape. Coach Stu Carlton reports and all players are expected to be ready to go against the Hill Toppers. However, several players were ailing this week — Gerald Valentine, with a bad foot, Jim

Kimmell, sore neck, and Don Bumgardner, "Charley Horse."

The team reported for a short meeting Monday afternoon and took the afternoon off, first break in the heavy drill schedule since practice started on August 15.

The Mountaineers passed the half-way point in the 1950 schedule last Friday and have posted a record of three wins, one loss and one tie. Conference record is one win (Forest City), no losses and one tie (Cherryville).

After the Rutherfordton-Spindale game Friday night the Mountaineers will have only one home game remaining on the schedule. Mt. Holly is to visit Kings Mountain on October 27th.

Kings Mountain plays Newton-Conover on October 29 at Newton and, after a November 3 open date, tackles two old rivals, Shelby (on November 10 there) and Lincolnton (November 17 there) to finish out the card.

Joining property. There was some expression of opinion in favor of purchasing the lot, but City Attorney J. R. Davis said he doubted that the city had legal authority to buy it on other than a cash basis. There was then some question as to the availability of the money and the group agreed to ask Mr. Fulton for a two-week extension of his offer, in order to investigate the matter further.

The commissioners voted to establish "no parking" on the west side of City street from Walker street to Waco Road, and on request of E. T. Platt, D. E. and David Cash, voted to install a hydrant and valve on a raw-water line near the residences of the three. The Messrs. Cash and Platt are to defray expenses of the installation. It declined request of H. T. Spearman to rent a parking place in front of Quality Sandwich Shop.

The question of relaxing a city ordinance to allow motion pictures on Sunday was listed on the agenda but got no formal action after Commissioner Hudson Bridges remarked, "I'm against it," and other board members stated similar views.

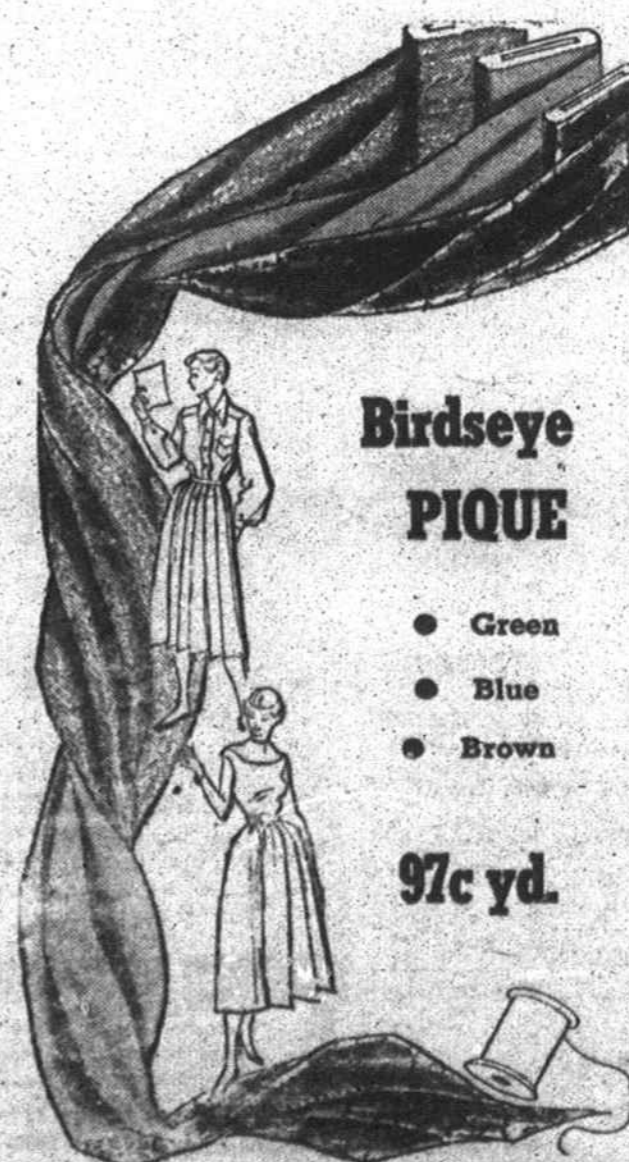
