3,076 Boys, Girls Attend 4-H Camps

L. R. Harrill, 4-H leader for the State College Extension Service, reported this week that 3,076 Tar Heel 4-H Club members spent a week at one of the four club camps in the State during the past summer.

An additional 531 club agents and adult leaders attended the camps, bringing the total to 3,607, Harrill said.

Millstone Camp, located in Richmond County, led in total attendance, with 1,055 boys and girls, 59 leaders, and 74 agents spending a week there. In addition, 48 attended the Young Men and Women's Conference, 79 were present for the State Wildlife Conference, and 81 attended other special encampments at Millstone, bringing its total for the season to 1,396.

Encampments at Mamoc were attended by 961 boys and girls, 60 agents, and 52 leaders, bringing the camp total to 1,073. The Swannanoa camp was attended by 349 boys and girls and 20 agents and leaders.

Camp Schaub, operating this season for the first time, was attended by 711 boys and girls and 58 agents and leaders. The camp, formally dedicated in exercises held earlier this fall, is located at the Mountain Branch Experiment Station near Waynesville.
