Central "Bees" Down Grammar All Stars 7-0

Future Varsity Prospects Meet Again Friday

Kings Mountain high school's "B" team and the Grammar Grade All Stars tangled at City Stadium on October 26 with the "Bees" coming out on top 7-0 in a hard-fought, well-played football game.

The two teams met again Friday night in another regular-length high school contest. Fullback Doug Falls cracked over from the four-yard line early in the first quarter for the only score of the game after Tackle Sammy McCarter had recovered an All Star fumble on the B 29-yard line to set up the game-winning tally. Falls went through the line for the extra point.

The touchdown drive went 71 yards with Falls contributing runs of 6, 7, 5, 6, 6, 7, 1, and 4. Tailback Dickie Webb made runs of 7, 3, 4, 1, 1 and 4, and Wingback Gene Patterson a run of 7 yards.

The most outstanding player of the game was the All Star's Frank Phillips who made runs of 1, 23, 3, 7, 2, 3, 4, 5, and 8 yards from the line of scrimmage. He also returned punts of 35, 7, 25, 4 and 27 yards. He threw one pass which he completed for 17 yards.

Gerald Adams, Sam McCarter, and Jim Caveny were outstanding on defense.

PLAY-BY-PLAY
Right End Eng Maddox kicked off to the B 15 and Webb returned 7 yards to the 22. Webb went off tackle for 2. Webb lost 2 and Doug Falls added 6 to the B 28. D. Falls punted to the AS 34.

Phillips returned the kick back to the B 31. Fullback Max Blanton added 4 off right tackle, then lost 1. On the next play Blanton fumbled on the B 29 and McCarter recovered to set up the winning score.

After the touchdown, McCarter kicked off to the AS 21 and halfback Darwin Moss returned it 13 yards to the 34. Fullback Joe Harrison added 6 yards off tackle as the first quarter ended. Score—B 7, AS 0.

Wingback Jerry Queen added 6 for a first down on the AS 46. Phillips made 1, while Moss and Queen were held to no gain. Quarterback Earl Marlowe punted.

Blocking Back Bob Eng returned the punt 5 yards to his own 26. D. Falls made runs of 6 and 3 yards. Webb added 3 for 8 first down on the B 38. Webb passed incomplete to End Jim McDaniel. Falls added 4 yards off tackle, while Webb could manage only 3 around end. D. Falls punted to the AS 23 and Phillips returned it to the AS 30.

Harrison was held to no gain on the first play and Marlowe passed complete to Left End Dean Blackwell for a 7 yard gain.

Phillips took a pitchout from Marlowe and scooted 23 yards to the B 40 before being caught from behind by Adams. Phillips made 3, and Queen was caught for a 1 yard loss. Halfback Richard George added 3 yards off left tackle. On fourth down, Queen passed incomplete to Maddox.

Webb made 2 yards for the "Bees" as the first half ended. Score: B 7, AS 0.

Second Half
McCarter kicked off to the AS 23 and Phillips grabbed the ball and ran it back to the AS 48. Phillips was stopped at the line of scrimmage and George made 4 off tackle. Phillips lost 3 on a reverse. Marlowe went through the center of the B line for 8 yards and first down on the B 43 yard line. On the next play, Marlowe fumbled and the B team recovered.

where Phillips grabbed the punt and carried it to the B 23. Phillips made runs of 4 and 5 yards. Queen added more for a first down on the B 9 yard line. Phillips had made 8, George lost 1 and on the next play, Marlowe fumbled with McCarter again recovering for the "B's".

D. Falls made 2, then 5, and wingback Patterson lost 3 on a reverse. D. Falls' punt was partly blocked and the AS took over on the B 14.

Phillips lost 3; Marlowe 1 but then Queen added 4 off right tackle. Queen lost 1 and the "Bees" took over.

D. Falls added runs of 4 and 7 to the B 25. D. Falls made 3 and Tailback James Abernathy was stopped for no gain. D. Falls added 8 to the B 36. Tailback Clyde Falls made 1. C. Falls then passed complete to Patterson on the All Star's 49 yard line as the game ended.
