More About Bus Station

ital. Fred Plonk reported that he had talked with the bus companies several times over the possibility of construction of a terminal on the lot adjoining the Patrol station on West King street, but that the companies would not agree to lease the station. They wished, he said, to have him lease it to some individual.

Mr. Davis' letter to the Utilities commission, a copy of which was addressed to L. A. Love, manager of Queen City Bus Company, at Charlotte, follows:

"As attorney for the City of Kings Mountain and at the request of the Mayor and Board of Commissioners, I am writing to you with reference to a situation in Kings Mountain which should be called to your attention.

"There is no bus station at all in Kings Mountain for the convenience of the traveling public. During rainy weather and especially during cold weather, women, children and old people who desire to ride the bus or who are put off in Kings Mountain have no waiting place or shelter from the cold or the rain. The bus station at present is from one end of the corporate limits to the other and it is necessary for any person who desires to ride a bus to stand on the street corners or out in the street and attempt to flag the bus. It might stop and it might not. This situation is very unsatisfactory for the people in Kings Mountain and it is also

hazard for the traveling public because entering or leaving the bus in the street is dangerous.

"All of our civic organizations together with our city council met in a mass meeting last night and passed a resolution authorizing that this matter be called to your attention with the hope and expectation that the Utilities Commission will compel the bus companies to erect a suitable bus station. As I understand the law the Utilities Commission has the authority, if necessary requires it, to compel the bus companies to provide the necessary facilities for the convenience of the traveling public in the various towns.

"If it is necessary for us to file a petition with your commission and have a hearing with reference to same we shall be glad to do so.

"Advise me with reference to same and we shall be glad to act accordingly."

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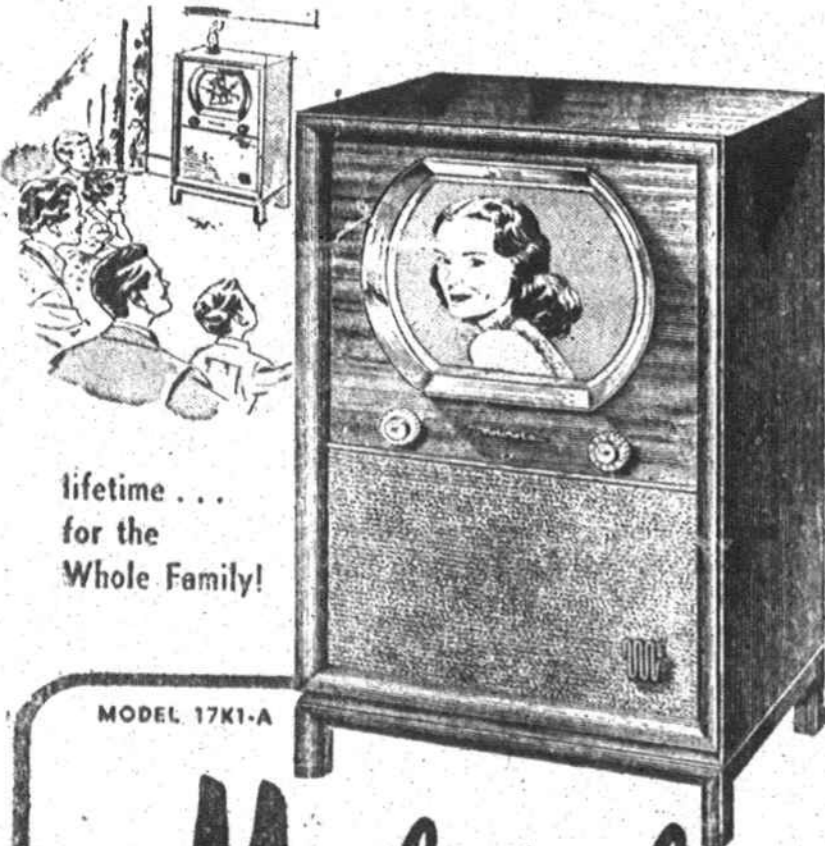
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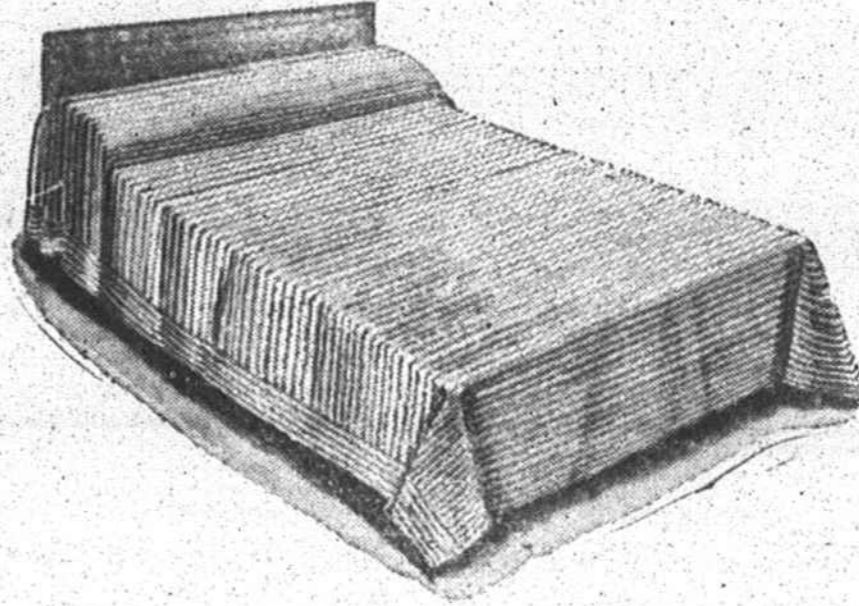
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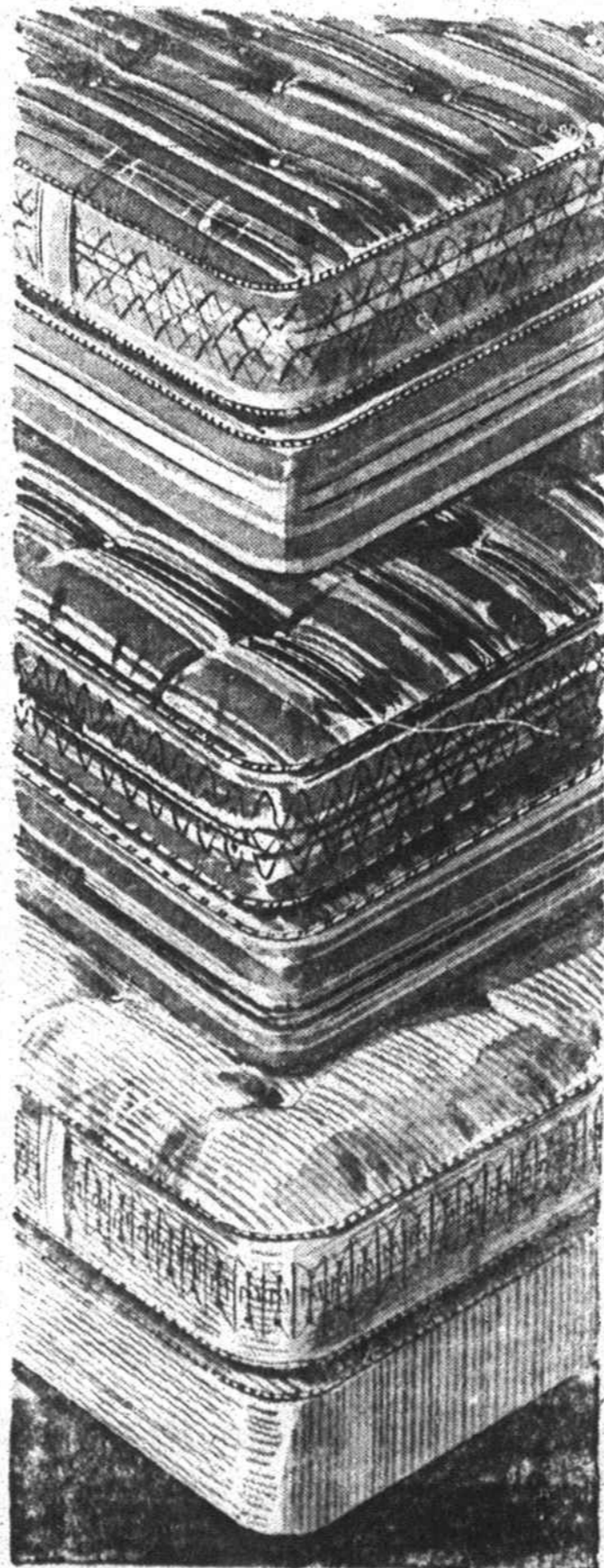
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
