Employment Law Violator Fined

George Melton, 314 Canster street, was found guilty of violating the Employment Security Law of North Carolina when tried before Justice of the Peace Lee Roberts on Thursday.

T. L. Whitley of Gastonia, claims deputy, brought charges on behalf of the Employment Security Commission alleging that Melton filed claims for unemployment compensation benefits for the weeks ending October 2, 1949, and October 9, 1942, and reported no work or earnings during the weeks, even though he had been employed by Kings Mountain Manufacturing Company and was paid wages during each of the weeks.

The claimant entered a plea of nolo contendere and after hearing the evidence, the Magistrate found him guilty as charged. Melton was fined \$20.00 on each of the two counts and taxed the costs of the action.

In addition to the penalty imposed by the court, the claimant's account will be adjusted by the Commission and a refund of \$15.00 ordered, representing all benefits paid after the first violation occurred. Furthermore, he will be declared ineligible for any further benefits during the remainder of his benefit year.

Mr. Whitley pointed out that utmost accuracy should be observed in filing claims for unem-

ployment compensation in order that prosecution can be averted. The investigative facilities of the Commission make it almost impossible that a claimant will not be detected if fraudulent claims are filed, he said.

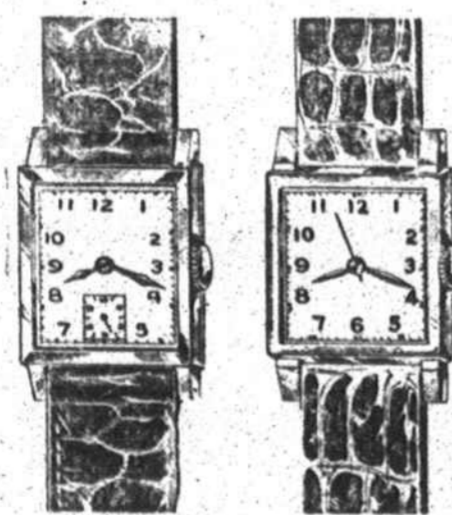

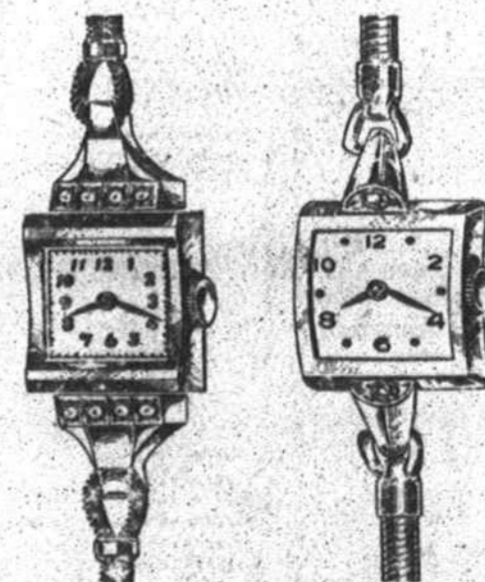
