8, Bethware 13. ORDINANCE TO REGULATE SPEED OF TRAINS THROUGH KINGS MOUNTAIN:

Whereas, the freight trains and passenger trains operated by the Southern Railway Company through the Corporate Limits of Kings Mountain at times have been operated at an excessive rate of speed which might endanger the lives of the citizens of Kings Mountain and due to several complaints on the part of the citizens of said city, it is advisable to regulate the speed of said trains:

At the regular meeting of the Mayor and Board of Commissioners for the City of Kings Mountain on Wednesday, Janu-ary 10, 1951, upon motion of Commissioner, B. H. Bridges and seconded by A. H. Patterson, Commissioner, the following odrinance was unanimously adopted:

That it shall be unlawful for any person, persons, firms or corporations to operate a train over the tracks of the Southern Rail-way through the City of Kings Mountain either a freight train or a passenger train at a greater rate of speed than thirty-five (35) miles per hour.

That any person, persons, firms or corporations violating this ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be fined Twenty-five (\$25.-00) Dollars or thirty (30) days in jail for each separate violation of this ordinance.

That this ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and af-ter the 15th of January, 1951. The foregoing ordinance was unanimously adopted on this the 10th day of January, 1951.


