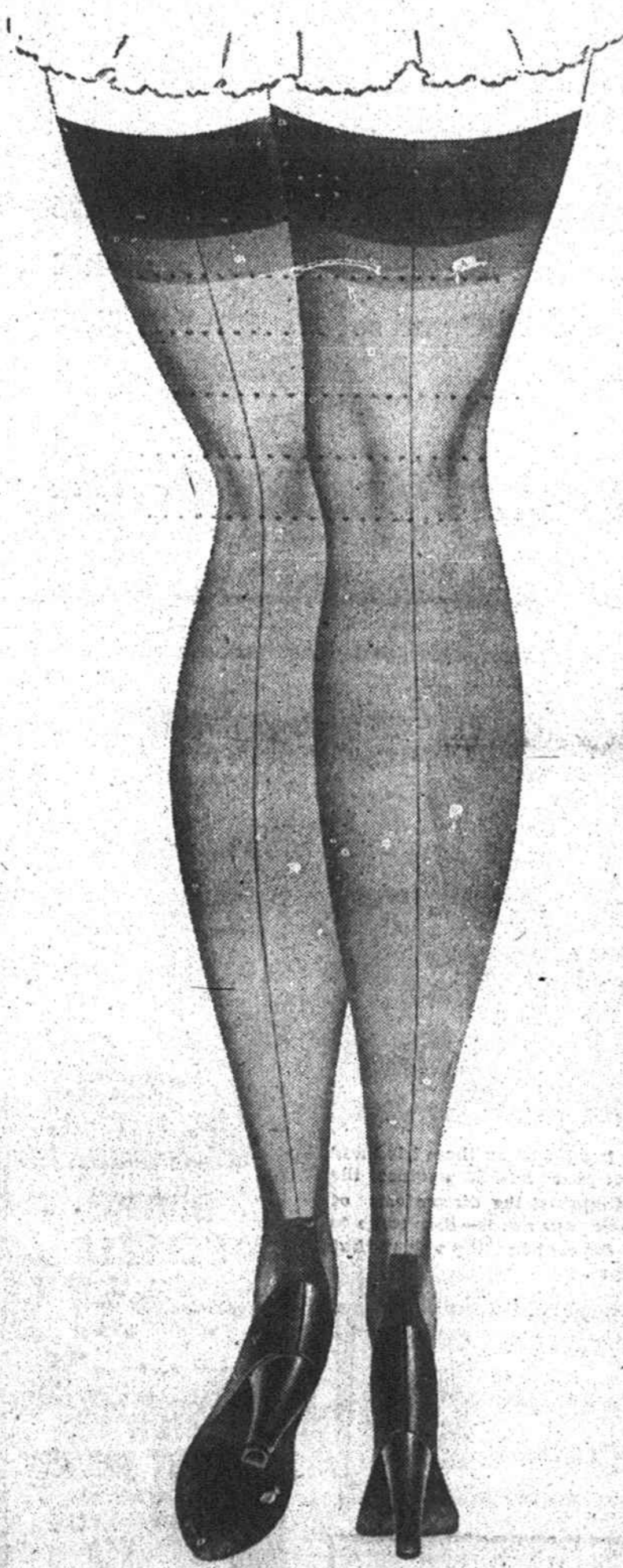

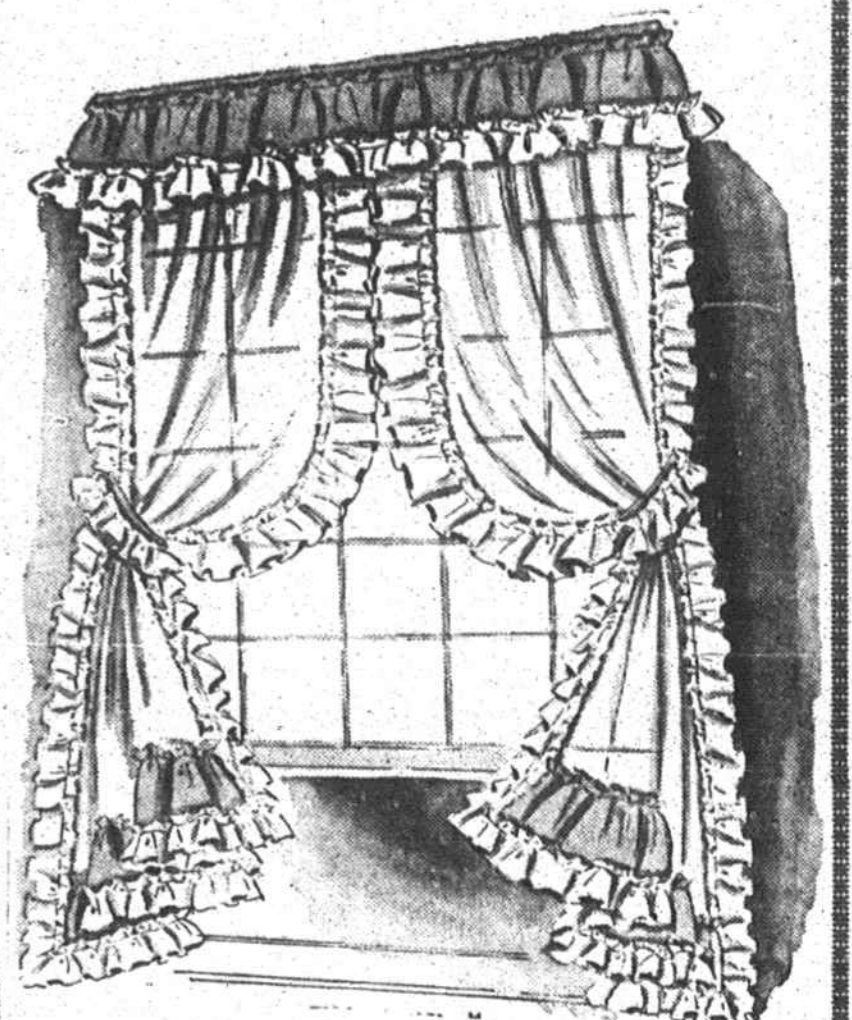
Miss Mary Blakely and Miss Beatrice Heron of Chester, S. C., are to spend the weekend with Mr. and Mrs. W. E. Blakely.
