Jack Mauney Honor Student

AMES, IOWA, May 23—Jackson R. Mauney, son of Mr. and Mrs. Paul Mauney, Route 2, Kings Mountain, N. C., was announced as the honor student in science-botany at the annual Honors Day convocation held Wednesday at Iowa State College.

An honor student is a student who has received a grade point average of at least 3.0 (4.0 is perfect), and has maintained the highest scholastic average in the senior class in his or her curriculum.

The Honors Day address was given by President Virgil M. Hancher of the State University of Iowa who spoke on "The Cult of the Average." Dr. Charles E. Friley, president of Iowa State College, presided at the convocation which was held for students, faculty members and the general public at 10:30 a. m. in State Gymnasium.

For more than a quarter of a century it has been the custom of the College to honor at a special convocation those students who are making the most of the opportunities offered them, especially in the field of scholastic endeavor. Those who have shown outstanding ability, and who were given recognition Wednesday were high scholarship students, honor students in each curriculum, initiates of honor societies whose chief requirement for election is scholarship and winners of special prizes awarded solely or largely on the basis of scholarship.
