A Florida fruit plate topped with ice cream was served with punch.

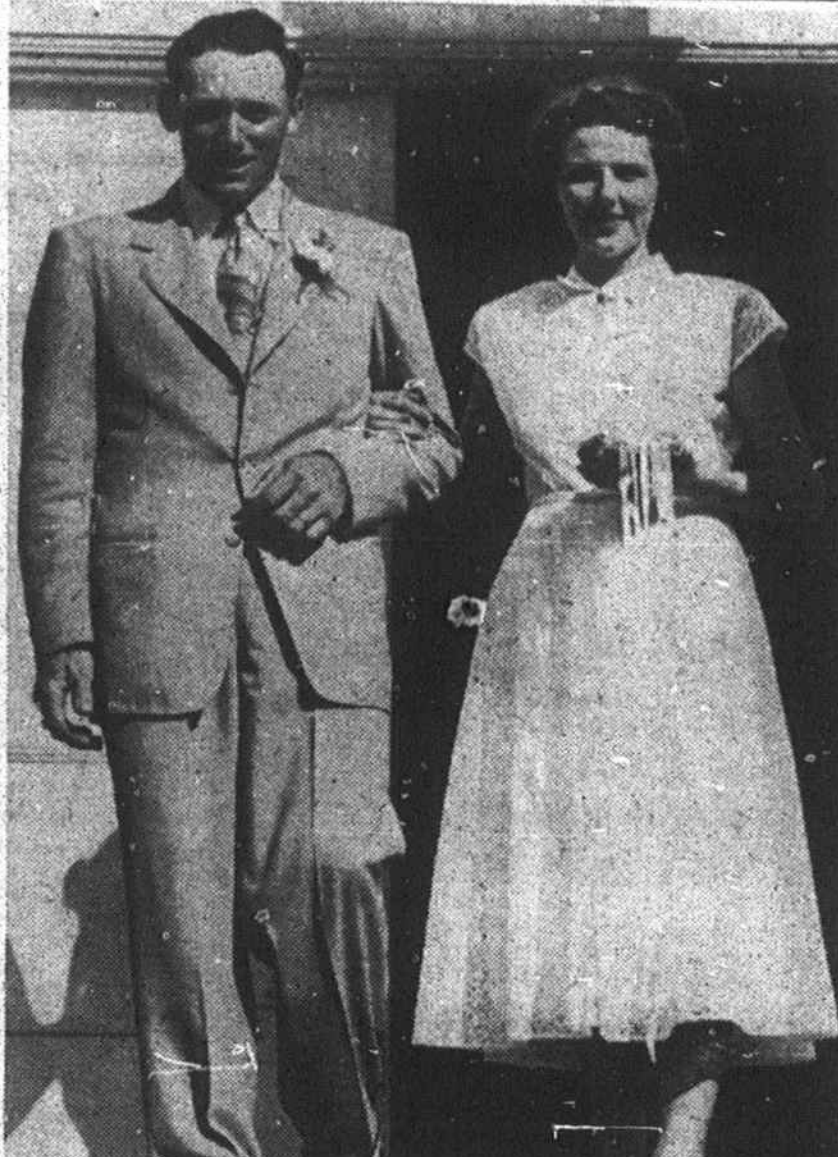
At the tally of scores, Mrs. R. R. Yarboro held high with Mrs. Littlejohn holding second high. The honorees were also remembered with gifts.
