

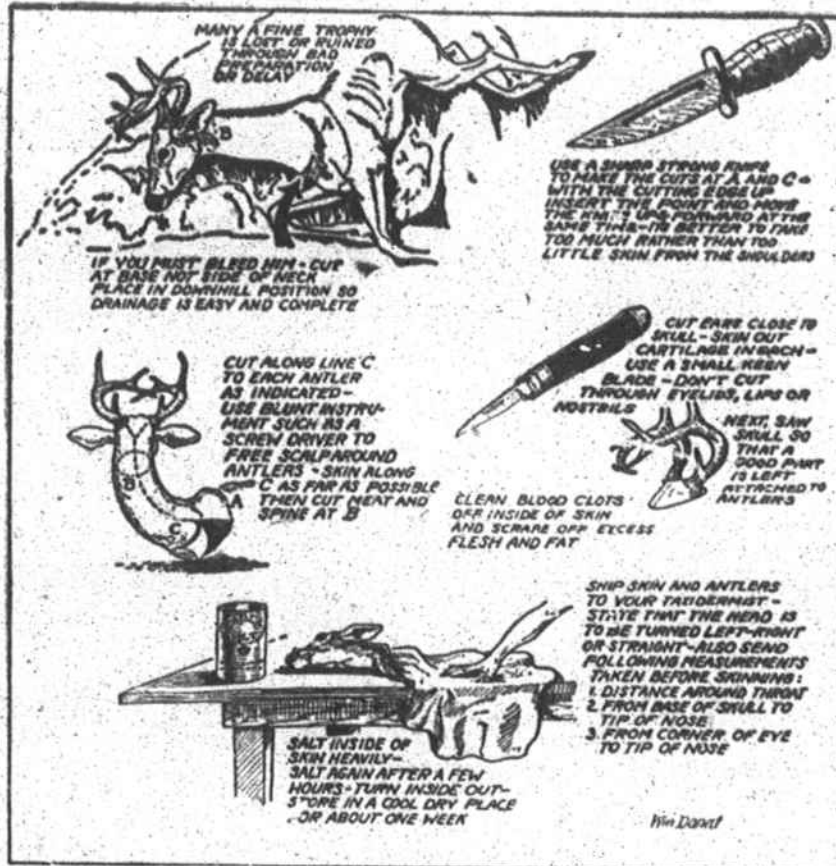
The productivity and crop adaptation of the soil are important in crop production.

First Disabled Korean Veteran Rehabilitated

The first disabled Korean veteran has completed his rehabilitation under a vocational training program for men disabled in active service since June 27, 1950.

He is Nguay F. Wong, a young Chinese-American veteran from San Francisco, who has been blinded in battle in Korea.

According to the last nationwide report of the Veterans Administration, 29 veterans were receiving vocational training under the program for persons disabled in active military service since June 27, 1950.

Wong during his short period of training has learned to conduct his entire business by sense of touch; to make change correctly from the feel of the coins; to place his merchandise so he could reach it all easily; to keep inventory; to place orders for items, and to do his own bookkeeping in Braille.

He also received a course in salesmanship and merchandising geared to the blind. He learned how to set up effective displays, and was taught to deal with people in a personal way, though unable to see them.

His instructors were officials of the California Bureau of Vocational Rehabilitation, who worked closely with V-A in carrying out the training program.

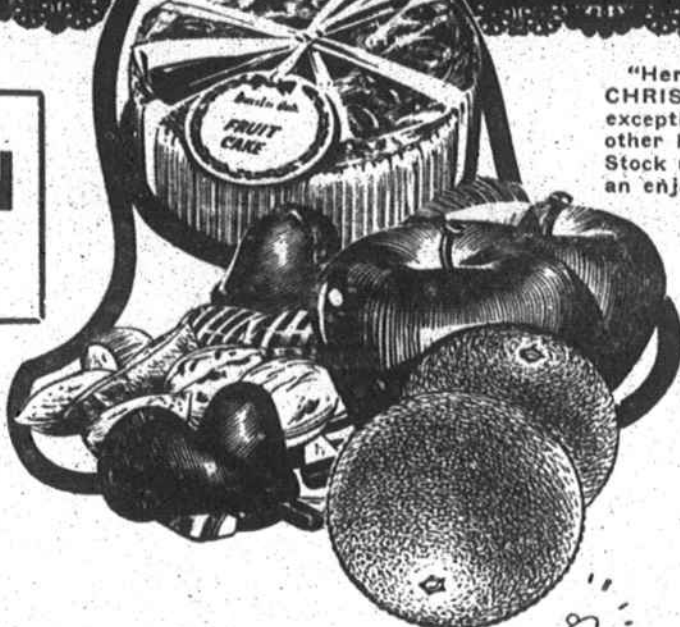
