

Negro Farmer

The work sheets provided Martin with a systematic way of reviewing his past operations, evaluating his land and labor cesources, and setting up goals for the future.

According to T. D. Williamsson, Rockingham Negro farm agent, Martin is aiming for a yield of 1,800 pounds per acre on his 1952 tobacco crop. He also wants to increase his corn yields from 35 to 60 bushels per acre. raise egg production per hen to more than 180 eggs annually. and increase his dairy production to 9,000 pounds of milk per cow per year.

Martin's farm consists of 167 acres, of which 48 will be in pastures and 35 in cropland. He also operates 200 acres of rented land, of which 60 acres will be in corn, 80 acres in hay, and eight acres in tobacco. His total tobacco crop




