### Funeral Rites Held Sunday For W. H. Belk

In the presence of a great throng, funeral services were held Sunday afternoon for William Henry Belk, 89, president of Belk Bros. Co., and widely acclaimed churchman and philanthropist.

Dr. Charles G. McClure, pastor of Caldwell Memorial church, of which Mr. Belk was a member and which he had served as elder and in other important capacities, officiated. Rites were conducted at the home, 220 Hawthorne Lane, and interment was in Elmwood cemetery.

Characteristically active until a few days before his death in a local hospital last Thursday, Mr. Belk would have been 90 on June 2. He had continued general direction of the vast mercantile empire which he founded and which now numbers 306 stores in 14 states. His death was caused by a heart attack.

Good Life Cited  
Dr. McClure rejoiced because of the goodness which expressed itself in such fine fashion and numerous ways in the life and works of Mr. Belk, who was accorded high praise not only as a pioneer merchant whose genius and industry resulted in powerful achievement, but also as a mighty pioneer in his spiritual conquests.

Great through his benefactions were, in behalf of churches, hospitals and other service-impaired agencies, the fidelity which marked his religious life and the goodness which made it grace-filled were cited as even more praiseworthy.

The minister referred to the distinguished merchant, philanthropist and churchman as "a prince and a great man in Israel." Essentially Mr. Belk was a man of large caliber who discharged with marvelous skill the constantly expanding duties which devolved upon him and made those widened horizons productive in the best sense of the term. His many

and generous benefactions in his local church, the presbytery, the synod and far beyond stemmed from his deep and abiding interest in worthy concerns and his profound religious convictions. Dr. McClure observed. His influence will continue to be felt most beneficially.

Born in 1862  
A son of Abel Nelson Washington Belk and Sarah N. Walkup Belk, William Henry Belk was born in the Waxhaw section of Lancaster County, S. C., June 2, 1862. When he was 11 years of age the family moved to Monroe, and it was there that he entered the mercantile business. The third store in the Belk system was opened in Charlotte in 1895, and almost incredibly great growth

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has been witnessed in the ensuing years. He had long been a leading citizen of Charlotte. In 1950 he was awarded the degree of Doctor of Laws by Davidson college. Some years earlier he was chosen for membership in Omicron Delta Kappa, national leadership fraternity. He was a Mason and a Shriner. Survivors include his wife, the

former Miss Mary Irwin Belk; five sons, W. H. Belk, Jr., Capt. John Belk, Irwin Belk, Henderson Belk and Tom Belk, all of Charlotte; a daughter, Miss Sarah Belk of Charlotte, and four grandchildren. Capt. John Belk has been serving in the United States Army in Korea the last 13 months.
