Vary Veal Sauces For Meat Servings

Veal's delicate flavor makes it an excellent food for serving with rich sauces. Food expert Reba Staggs points out that since veal is young and has only a light fat coating it is best cooked by slow moist heat, making it simple to prepare the meat with a sauce. This meat combines well with a wide range of flavors. For instance, after the veal steak (arm or blade, sirloin), cutlet or chop (rib, loin or kidney) is browned, add condensed tomato soup or tomato juice or cream of the usual cooking liquid, water. Sour cream is another ideal cooking liquid to produce a rich sauce in which to serve veal. Cream of celery soup, sweet-sour sauce or currant jelly lightly thinned with hot water are other possible cooking liquids. With the liquid added, cover the utensil tightly and let the meat cook slowly until tender. This will be about 45 minutes to one hour, depending upon the thickness of the meat.
