## Calf Sales On State-Wide Basis

Some 3,500 animals are expect ed to be entered in 14 feed calf sales to be held in North Carolina during 1952, according to J. S. Buckanan, livestock specialist for the State College Extension Ser-

For the first time, the sales have been organized on a Statewide basis.

Although the sales will not be held until September and October, prospective sellers need to do several things right now to get their animals ready.

For example, all calves entered

in the sales must be vaccinated for blackleg. They must also be vaccinated for shipping fever at least 10 days prior to the sale.

No bull calves will be sold. All animals must be dehorned. Every precaution must be taken to see that heifer calves are not bred. Only calves of strictly beef


