Bessemer Native Dies In Columbia

Funeral services for Mrs. David Mabry Mobley, of Columbia, S. C., nee of Mrs. A. H. Patterson, were held Friday afternoon at 3 o'clock at First Baptist church in Columbia, S. C. Dr. Maylors, pastor of the church, officiated and burial was in Green Lawn cemetery. Mrs. Mobley died last Wednesday afternoon at Baptist hospital after being critically ill since August, 1951.

She is a native of Bessemer City and is the daughter of Mrs. Frances Rebecca Long McGill and the late Thomas Abernathy McGill. She spent her early girlhood in North Carolina and received her high school education here. She is a graduate of Columbia college and did stenographic work at Germany-Roy-Brown in Columbia after graduation.

could cut composing costs by 75 percent with a machine called the "Justewriter". It did not announce when it would begin regular publication.

By naming the paper the Kings Mountain News, the publishing company assumes the name of a former Kings Mountain newspaper which folded in 1928, after a short life. The former Kings Mountain News was published by Milton Tiddy, of Lincolnton, doing business at News Publishing Company. It operated in the building now occupied by the A & P Food Store.

Some Kings Mountain citizens who remembered the Tiddy operation were under the impression that the company was a corporation, but this was not proved out, there being no record in the files of the North Carolina Secretary of State of any such company having ever been chartered in Kings Mountain.

Eugene Matthews, veteran Herald mechanical superintendent, recalled that the former Kings Mountain News was organized by O. B. Carpenter, Hayne Blackmer, W. H. McGinnis and W. K. Mauney.

Several months after this paper ceased publication, the physical plant was sold under mortgage foreclosure to W. C. Russ and Ernest Phillips in 1928. They published a weekly paper called the Kings Mountain Times until May 1929. At this time, Mr. Russ says, the economic panic which was to hit all over the globe in the autumn was already on in Kings Mountain.

"We decided to close shop and were able to pay our bills and leave town," Mr. Russ recalls.

Mr. Russ, for the past 22 years, has been the publisher of the Waynesville Mountaineer, a prosperous semi-weekly. His former partner, Mr. Phillips, now operates a large printing business in Washington, D. C.

The publisher of the projected paper, Leonard Edge, former advertising manager of the Elizabethon, Tenn., Star, moved over the weekend into the Cooper Apartments on E. King Street, occupying the apartment recently vacated by Mr. and Mrs. O. Z. White. The Whites have moved to Greenville, S. C. Mrs. Edge is a cousin of Mrs. Paul Mauney.

Woodrow Kimbrell was taxed with the costs of court after being convicted of assault.

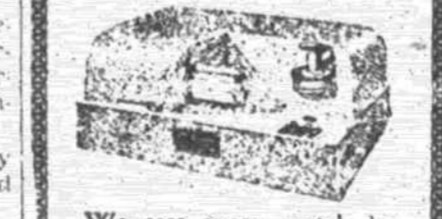
Capias were issued for Eugene Brown, charged with disposing of mortgaged property, and Emmett Tate, charged with reckless driving.
