Kings Mountain, April 17, Kings Mountain dropped a Western (AA) contest to Cherryville here on April 15 by 6 to 5.

Cherryville scored the tying run in the eighth on no hits, as Pearson walked one batter, hit one and wild-pitched the tally.

Kings Mountain rallied in the bottom of the ninth, but the effort fell short with one run. Dewitt Guyton, 3b, walked after one was out, and after two were out, Jim Crawford, 1b, was hit by the pitcher. Shortstop Franklin Platt doubled home the run and Pearson fanned to end the game.
