## New Minerals Firm Just "Prospecting"

"We don't know what we've got, if anything," J. E. Herndon said this week, commenting on the report that a new corporation, Cleveland Minerals, Inc., owned mineral rights on lands with uranium deposits.

The firm was recently incorporated with Mr. Herndon as president and treasurer with J. R. Davis as secretary, and J. J. Mullins as the third incorporator. The authorized capitalization is \$100,000 with subscribed stock of \$300.

"Geologists will check the area where we have mineral rights to determine what we have, if anything, in the near future," Mr. Herndon said.

J. R. Davis had indicated that there might be liberal deposits of bauxite, the ore from which aluminum is extracted.
