### Postoffice Receipts Show Gain In July

Postal receipts at Kings Mountain postoffice showed a large gain in July, compared with receipts for July 1951, according to report of George Hord, assistant postmaster.

### Mile. Collet Plonk School Faculty Member

ASHEVILLE — Dr. Laura Plonk of the Plonk School of Creative Arts, announces that Mademoiselle Therese Collet of Paris, France, will teach dalcroze eurythmics and advanced piano-forte at the Plonk School during the winter season of 1952-1953.

Mademoiselle Collet has a diploma of Professeur de Rythmique from the Institut Jacques-Dalcroze in Paris. She passed her examination under Jacques-Dalcroze himself. She is a graduate of the Conservatoire International de Musique, Paris. She is a pupil of Madame Jeanne Blancard, teacher of piano-forte technique at the Ecole Normale de Musique de Paris.

Mademoiselle Collet taught at the Institut Jacques-Dalcroze in Paris for several years and, before coming to America this summer, was engaged in piano-forte teaching in Paris under the direction of Madame Blancard.

Dalcroze eurythmics was originated by the Swiss composer and teacher Emile Jacques-Dalcroze. It was primarily a method of training in musical rhythm through bodily movement. But the principles embraced by this revolutionary kind of music teaching proved to be of such fertile and artistic dimensions that Dalcroze eurythmics has become known not only as a system of music teaching, but as a general mental and physical education for rhythm in all the arts.

Dalcroze eurythmics is an education for the body in the execution of natural movements that receive their impetus from musical rhythm. It is an education of the mind in memory, concentration, and coordination. It is the beginning of the ability to appreciate and interpret music. It is an especial preparation for the study of movement as expressed in the drama and the dance.

In the education of the child and the creative adult, dalcroze eurythmics is an indispensable. Dr. Plonk pointed out. It is a mental exercise that brings the habit of quick response and reaction. It is a physical exercise that relaxes muscles and nerves and transforms awkward, angular bodies into lines of poise, grace, and beauty. Dalcroze eurythmics provides for the integrated role of the mind and body and gives a real inner possession of musical rhythm.

Comments of educators and musicians:

Karl Gehrkens, Oberlin Conservatory: "Dalcroze eurythmics is recognized the world over as the most complete method of developing the rhythmic sense that has ever been devised. But it goes far beyond mere training in rhythm in that it influences the hearing attitude and the outlook upon life in general."

Olin Downes, Music critic of the New York Times: "I am certain that in coordinating physical beauty and rhythm with musical rhythmic designs Mr. Jacques-Dalcroze's teachings have been invaluable in the progress toward the harmony of spirit, mind and senses, which alone make possible a complete and beautiful life."

The late Walter Damrosch: "If the teachings of Jacques-Dalcroze were accepted and taught to children of the entire world, it would effect a revolution and a finer, nobler race would be the result."

The Plonk School was the first to bring the teaching of dalcroze eurythmics to the South, having first offered it in 1924.

The Plonk School of Creative Arts, both college and day school departments, open for the fall term on September 8.
