QUESTION: What chance has the farmer got in knowing whether he is getting the full market value for his cotton?

ANSWER: A good one, according to D. H. Stencil, State College extension cotton marketing specialist, if he will avail himself of the Smith-Doxey Classing Service, made possible by the Smith-Doxey Act.

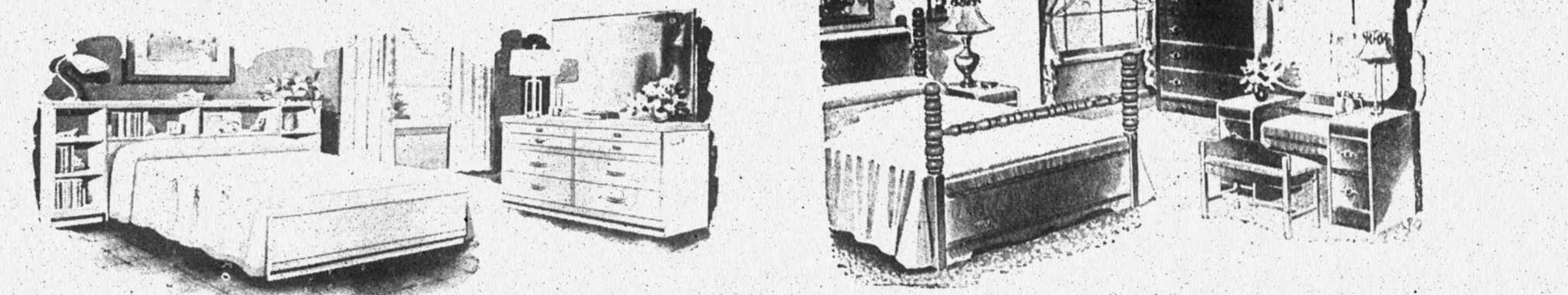
If you want to know as much about your cotton as the man who buys it, Stencil asserts, all you have to do is request that your ginners send samples to Raleigh where a staff of experts will classify them.

Here's what several farmers have to say of the service: J. T. Lawrence, Route 2, Tarboro — "You know what you are doing. It puts you in a similar position to that of the buyer..." Lawrence keeps a record of the grade and staple on each bale of cotton ginned. He knows which farmer on his land has the highest quality cotton and which ginners give him the best grades.

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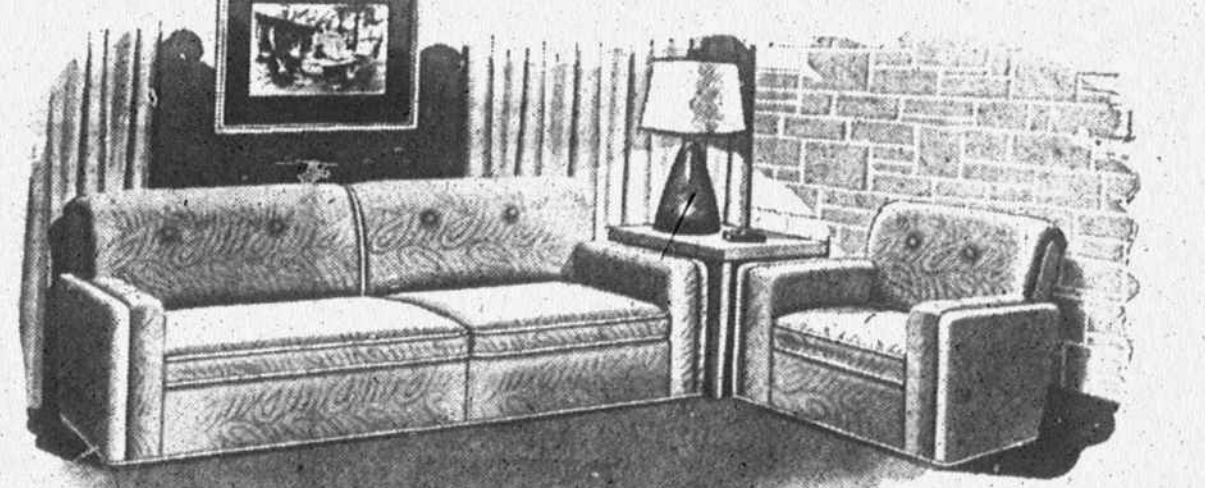

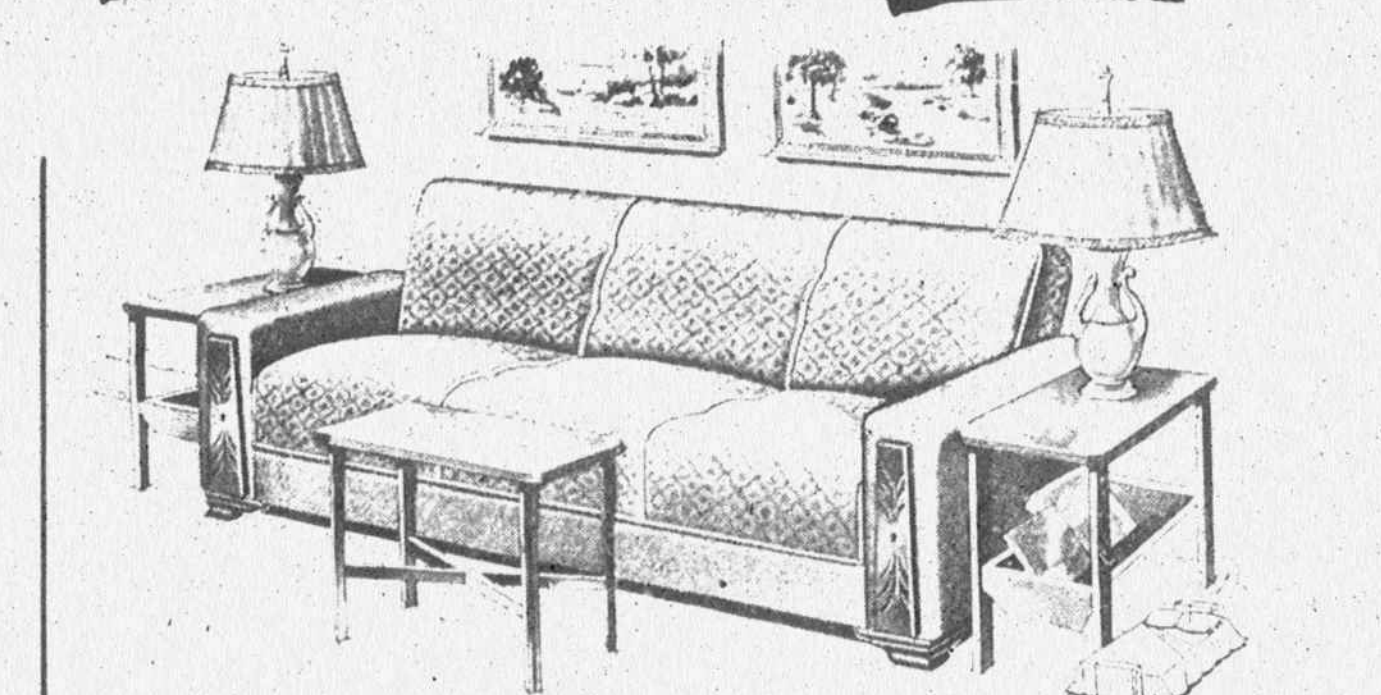
