The play, "Fresh, Variable Winds", seventh in a series of nine programs on child guidance being presented by the city schools, was given at Central school on November 11.

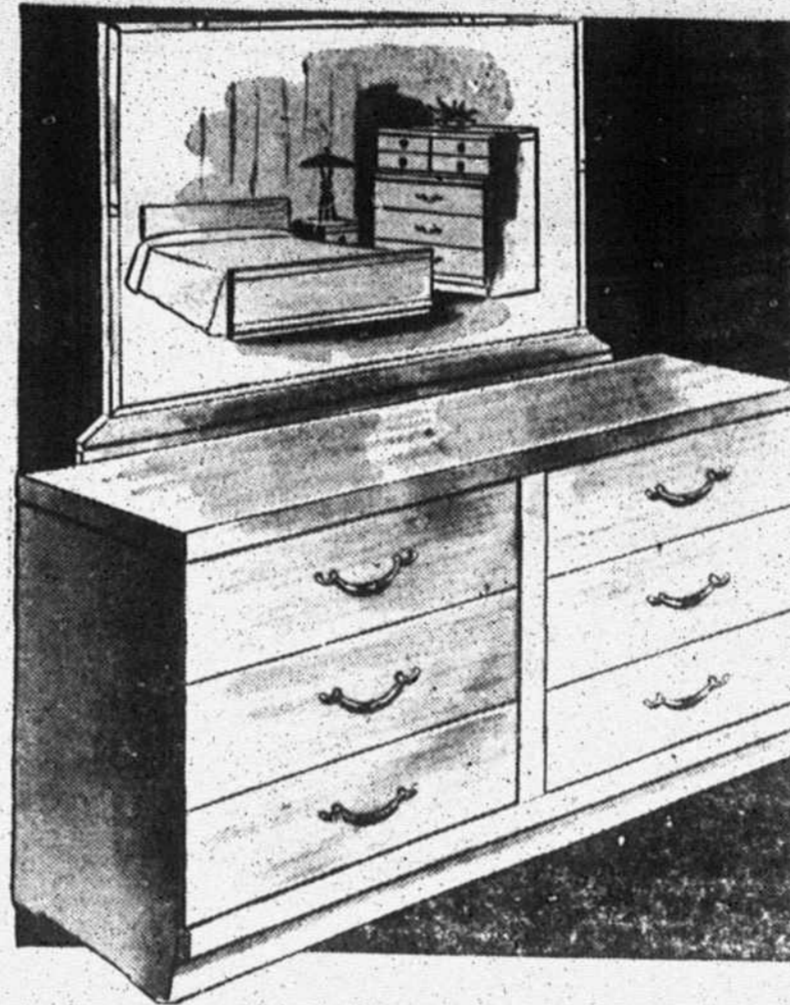

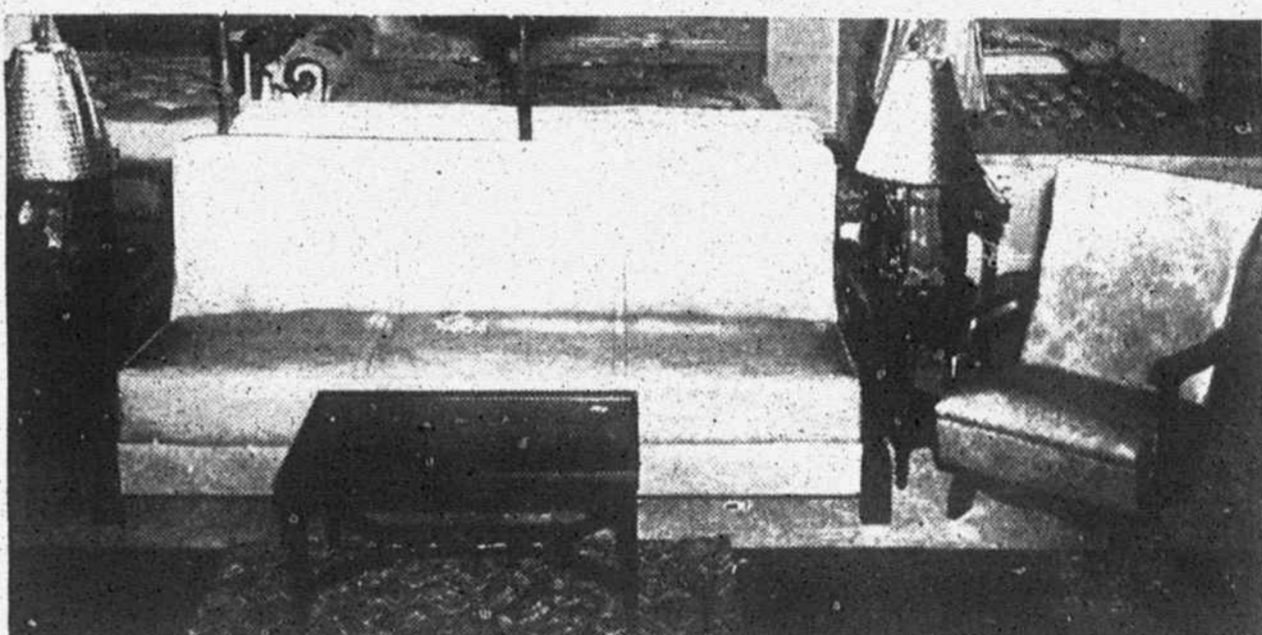
