Children's Home Society, In 50th Year, Making Annual Fund Drive

GREENSBORO, N. C. — Fifty years ago a group of public-minded citizens started the Children's Home Society of North Carolina and now that same Society, still being sponsored by big-hearted citizens of the State, is making its annual Christmas Fund drive. This year the goal is for \$55,000 in order that this only state-wide, non-sectarian agency licensed to care for babies and to find them homes may continue and expand its services to meet today's needs.

Letters and folders announcing this goal were mailed last week to 15,000 North Carolinians asking their support for the youngest of its citizens. The Society takes care of children from every county in the State, and it sends them back to homes all over North Carolina. During these years well over 5,000 babies and little children have found homes through this organization.

William J. Armfield, III, president of the Board of Directors, asks that in preparing Christmas gift lists that the Children's Home Society be listed also. It receives no tax funds, it gives its services free to all and it exists entirely on voluntary contributions. He urges one to remember that at the Home living costs too have increased and that, furthermore, there will probably be an increase this year of about 50 babies over the 350 given assistance last year. During the first six months of 1952, 121 babies were helped, 52 school-age children were aided, and 817 couples seeking to adopt children were counseled.

In order to fulfill the primary objective of the Society — to make the best possible plan for the child who comes into its care — a trained and qualified staff of social workers, plus executive personnel and administrative people and nurses, must be available at all times. They function under the guidance of a Board of Directors elected annually by the contributors. There are four responsibilities the Society makes every effort to meet. These are: a safe place where the child may stay while the most important decisions of its life are being made; skilled counseling to explore every possible plan for its future; all possible facilities for becoming acquainted with the child; and legal safeguards to make sure that the carefully developed plan for its future will bear the weight of whatever situations may arise in later years.

The Home is located at 740 Chestnut Street, Greensboro, as is the mail office. The Western District office is at Asheville. In addition to the salaried personnel, leading doctors, lawyers and other professional people donate their time and services to caring for the babies at the nursery and helping to work out adoption details. All services of the Society are absolutely free.

It costs an average of \$250 for each baby while it rer sins in the Home. \$500 is needed to provide all the services necessary to care for the child and secure his adoption. A baby is usually ready for adoption from the Home after no longer than 5 to 7 weeks. This waiting period allows time for the natural relatives to be sure of their actions, allows time for physical, mental and personality testing of and for becoming acquainted with the child, and for the proper selection of its adoptive parents and home.

As many as 18 babies can be cared for at the nursery at one time. Often there are other babies in supervised boarding homes. From whence do these babies come? Cases workers go out all over the State in response to calls for help for a baby in trouble. Maybe it has been left in a hospital, or even a hotel room, by a desperate young girl separated from the baby's father. Perhaps he was born out of wedlock. Over and over again the mothers of the babies come to the Society before the child is born and make plans for the future safety of the baby. Whatever is the reason that brings them to the attention of the Children's Home Society, each baby gets the most careful individual planning, by people trained in their work who can be counted upon to give them that extra something that training alone never provides and that no money can buy.

In addition to this human feeling, however, money is needed and this Annual Christmas Fund Drive is the opportunity for North Carolinians to show their feeling for these its youngest citizens. All donations, deductible

RALEIGH — The State Highway Patrol rolled up 1,809,903 miles of cruising on the highways of the state during October and arrested 10,826 traffic law violators in the process.
A report of activities from Patrol Commander W. B. Lentz showed the troopers spot checked 134,804 drivers' licenses, issued 9,267 warning tickets, and investigated 8,001 complaints during the month.
They recovered 68 stolen vehicles and conducted an investigation at the scene of 2,211 accidents in which 78 persons were killed.
