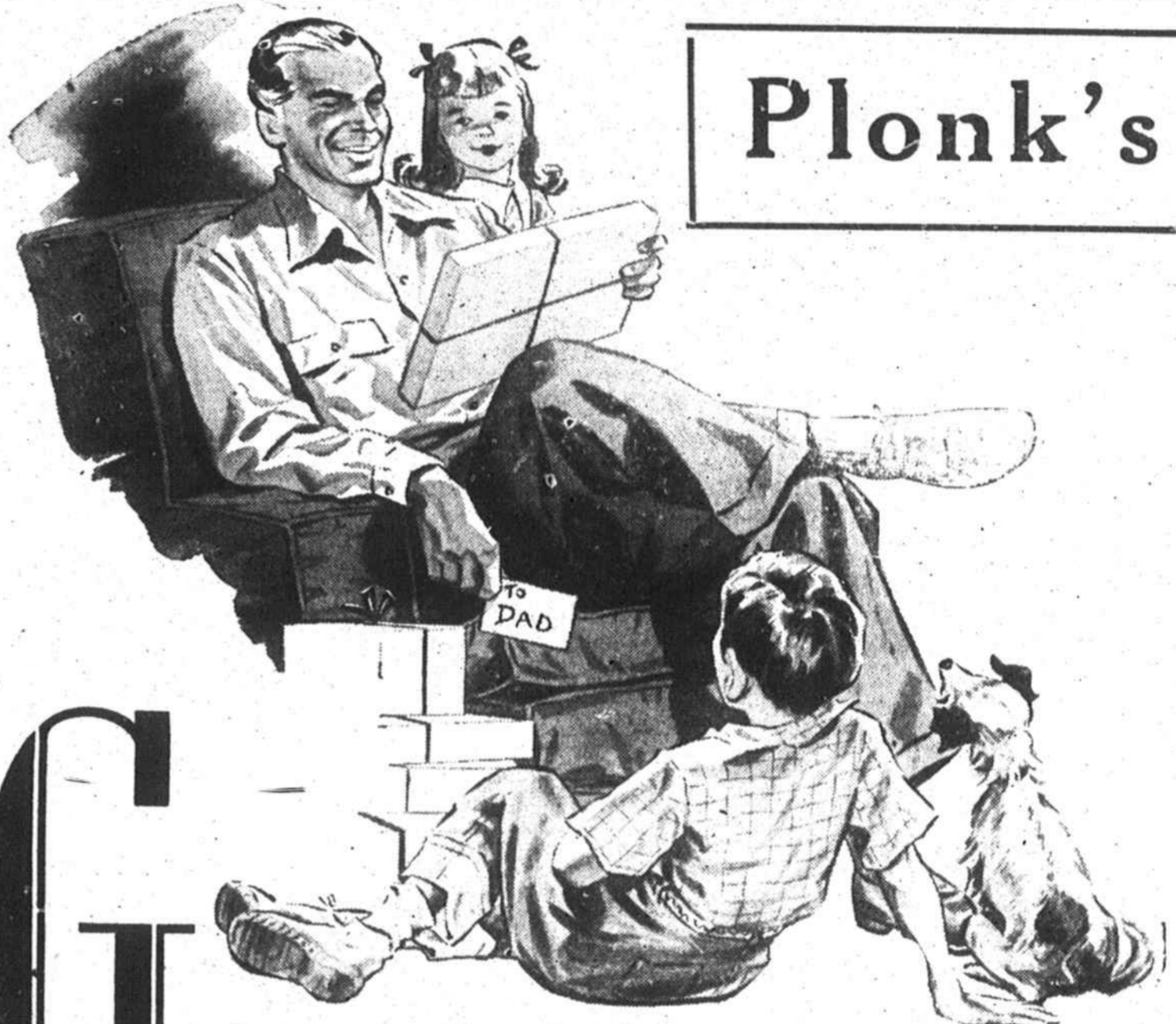
Ramsey Purchases Aderholdt Grocery
