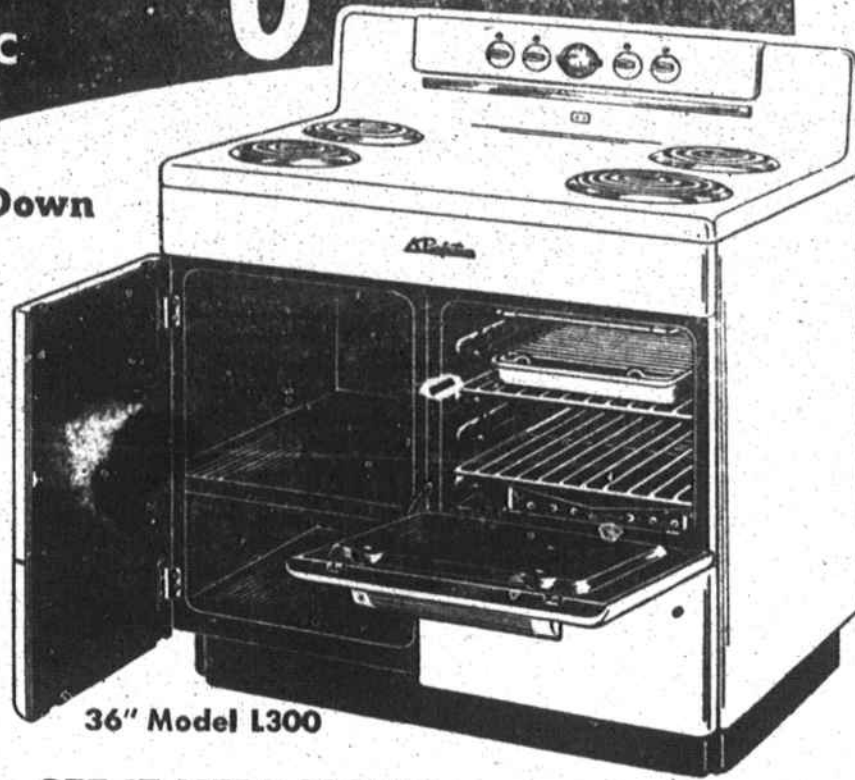

Harmon Property Bid Increased

The T. N. Harmon property and residence at the corner of Battleground avenue and Falls street will be sold for the third time by the commissioner on Saturday, July 11, according to notice published in today's issue of the Herald.

Re-sale was necessitated Tuesday when B. D. Ratterree, Kings Mountain realtor, raised the former high bid of \$7,030 by the required five percent. The bidding at the July 11 sale will start at Mr. Ratterree's bid of \$7,381.50.

Not raised was the bid of Fred J. Wright, Sr., on the T. N. Harmon half-interest in a ten and one-quarter acre tract adjoining lands of Crescent Hill Development Company, no new bid having been received by the expiration of the deadline on Tuesday. The Wright bid was \$551.25.

A third tract on Waco Road was previously sold at commissioner's sale to Hal Plonk.

Following resale on July 11, the bidding will again remain open for ten days prior to confirmation.
