**Patterson-Thompson Vows Said Saturday In Formal Ceremony At ARP Church**

Simplicity and beauty characterized the decorations of Boyce Memorial ARP church Saturday evening, June 26, at 7:30 o'clock, when Miss Iris Wilbert Patterson, of Kings Mountain, became the bride of Robert Leon Thompson, of Enka.

Vows were exchanged against a background of stately palms, ferns, and smaller palms, interspersed with four wrought-iron candelabrum holding seven lighted white tapers arranged in pyramid fashion. Potted green and white calladiums further carried out the green and white color note, and a large arrangement of white gladioli, garza chrysanthemums, and calla lilies completed the altar decorations.

The ceremony was performed by Dr. W. L. Pressly, pastor of the bride, using the double-ring ritual for the couple.

Mrs. Fuller McGill, organist, presented a prelude of organ music. Organ selections included "Sheep May Safely Graze" by Bach, "Romance" by Sibelius, "Meditation from Thais" by Massenet, "Ave Marie" by Schubert, "My Heart at Thy Sweet Voice"

**Reception**

After the ceremony, a reception was held at the home of the bride's parents on Gold street.

The bride's table was overlaid with a Sardinian lace cloth, combining fillet insertions with needlepoint lace and an embroidered border and center. A five-branched silver candelabrum was used at one end of the cloth, and an arrangement of white gladioli, feverfew, baby's breath, and garza chrysanthemums was set at the other end of the table. A five-branched silver candelabrum and a silver service was used on the buffet, and all-white flower arrangements were used in other receiving rooms of the home.

Punch was served from a glass-top table on the side porch. The table was decorated in garlands of smilax with an arrangement of daisies placed in the center of the table underneath the glass. Gifts were displayed in the den.

**Monday Court Docket Long**

The implication of another Negro resulted in a lesser charge for a route 2, Kings Mountain Negro, in City Recorder's Court Monday afternoon.

Willie Harris, charge dwelt with violation of the prohibition law stated that the liquor found in his possession by Officers P. A. Hawkins and R. R. Carrigan was given to him by another "feller" and he was on his way to the "feller's" house with the liquor when he was arrested.

On examination by Judge Jack

White, Harris implicated Fred Roberts, Negro.

Judge White found Harris not guilty on the original charge, but guilty of illegal possession of liquor for beverage purposes, and ordered the court to issue a warrant for Roberts on information and belief that Roberts is guilty of transporting intoxicating non-tax paid liquor. Harris was also ordered by the court to appear against Roberts as prosecuting witness.

The case was continued until next Monday.

Prayer for judgment was continued for a period of one year for Grover C. Keller on condition that the defendant properly support and maintain his three children ages 10, 11, and 13. Keller was charged with non-support.

Prayer for judgment for one month was also continued for Alexander Gordon, Negro, of route 1, charged with second offense of driving while drunk. Judgment was continued in order that the defendant might have an opportunity to acquire monies for fines.

Woodrow Wilson McClure, Ne-

gro, of route 3, Gastonia, appealed to Superior court a six-months suspended road sentence after Judge White found the defendant guilty of driving drunk.

The defendant stated that Johnny McClure, Kings Mountain Negro, was the driver of the vehicle, but arresting Officer Laymon Cornwell testified he saw the defendant park the car. Desk Sgt. Tom Gladden also stated that the defendant was in no condition to drive a vehicle. McClure's sentence was suspended on condition that he be of good behavior for six months, pay a fine of \$100, costs of court, and that his driver's license be revoked for a period of one year.

Robert Dawkins, Negro, of 402 W. Ridge street, was found guilty of assault on a female, and received a four months road sentence, suspended on condition that the defendant be of good behavior for six months, pay a fine of \$5, and costs of court.

Ida Mae Dawkins, Negress, wife of the defendant, stated that she was angry with the defendant at the time she signed the war-

rant.

The case against Muriel Whitesides, route 1, Clover, S. C., charged with disposing of mortgaged property, was continued until next Monday in order that the defendant may bring to court the property in question.

Three defendants were found guilty of public drunkenness.

A capias was issued for William L. Moore, charged with assault on a female, and a capias alias was issued for Ray Kimbrell, charged with violation of prohibition laws.

The case of Tommy Tucker, charged with driving while drunk

was transferred to Shelby for a trial by jury at the request of the defendant.

One case was continued, that of Stokes Gladden, of 27 Gantt street, charged with issuing a worthless check.

Bertha Jordan, Negress, was found guilty of larceny of wearing apparel, Friday morning in City Recorder's court and received a 30-day jail sentence. Sentence was suspended on "payment of costs of court, and on condition that the defendant not bother or wear any clothing of prosecuting witness, Eloise Patterson, Negress.
