When guests arrived, tables were laid for refreshments, and Mrs. Gamble served a chicken salad course with dessert. Fall flowers and potted plants decorated the home.

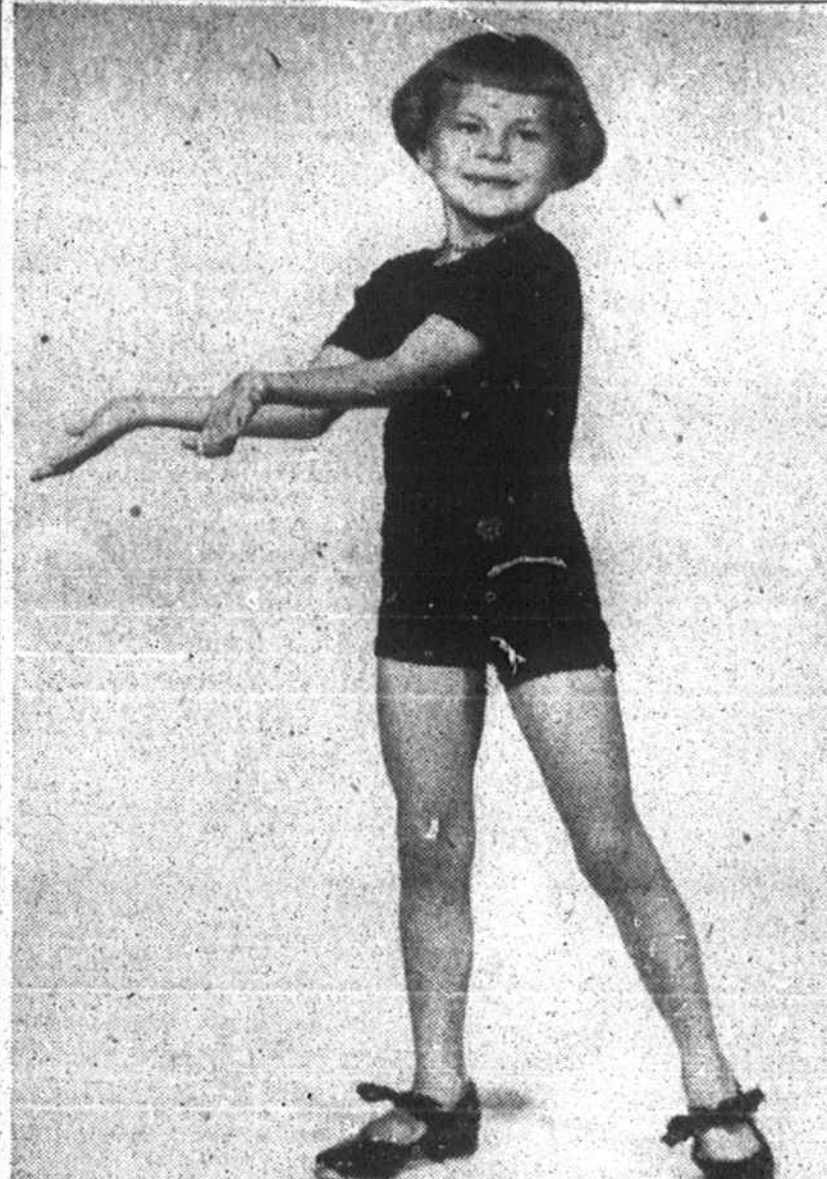

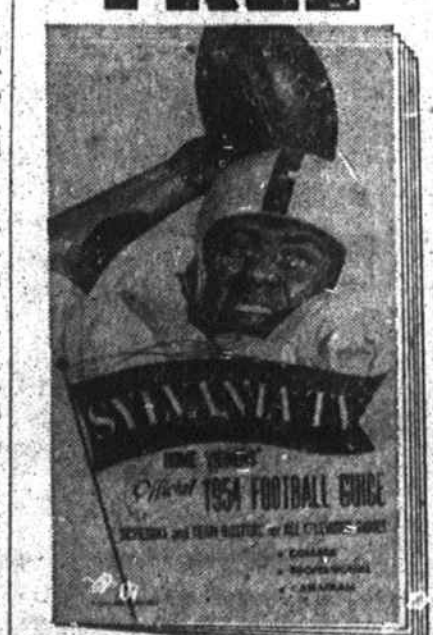
