

Continued On Page Eight **Assembly Changes** "Warrant" Statute

Potential law-breakers, who have been enjoying a respite from arrest due to a quirk in the state's law pertaining to warrants, are being warned that the honeymoon is over.

Chief of Police Hugh A. Logan, Jr., noted this week that the General Assembly has revised the law to make it possible for an officer to arrest persons for misdemeanors with out having previously obtained a warrant. The revised statute provides that an officer may arrest a person on "sight of the misdemeanor."

The ruling of the attorney general on the old statute required officers to obtain warrants before arresting persons for misdemeanors. Chief beneficiaries of the ruling were those about to be arrested for public drunkenness.
