LETTER TO THE EDITOR

Dear Editor:

As an American citizen, observing the problem between Employer and Labor, I write you, one newspaper in — at the least — each town or city in the United States having a population of 5,000 or over, making this suggestion:

Strikes tie up street cars, bus lines, railways, telephones, shipping lines, airways, automobile and steel industries, generally incommensurate and distressing the nation.

Under our Constitution, men have freedom of contract: they have the right to possess and use property freely, without interference from others; they have the right to establish and carry on business in their own way, employing others to help them, freely, by contract, as they may desire and be able.

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Accordingly, this is the suggestion:

Next year is election year. All members of the House of Representatives of Congress and part of the Senate will be elected.

State officials, Governors and legislators will be elected. You, an Editor in your locality, will have a touch with these candidates, as to who is nominated, and who shall be elected, both for Federal and for State offices.

being in conjunction with others all over the United States, might get results. As to the enforcement of the laws when enacted, any official, as a Governor, who will not enforce the laws of the State would be an unfaithful official who could be replaced at the next election.

Then, let laws be made bringing Labor under the Anti-Trust laws.

Let strikes and picketing be made unlawful.

For differences between employer and employee, let Courts

of Adjustment be created in every State, especially charged to hear complaints, with evidence, and to give judgments enforceable by injunction and the full power of the State with appeal to the Supreme Court of the State.

Let Federal Unions be forbidden, and require Unions to be citizens (i. e. corporations) of each State, as is every man, subject to the laws of the State, the relations of employer and employee being a domestic matter enforceable as are other domestic problems of the citizen.

Let the American Bar Association

enact and to enforce the necessary laws by Congress and in our States. This is as much for the benefit of Labor as to help the employer. It puts all under law, and stops intimidation and sabotage. And it protects the public.

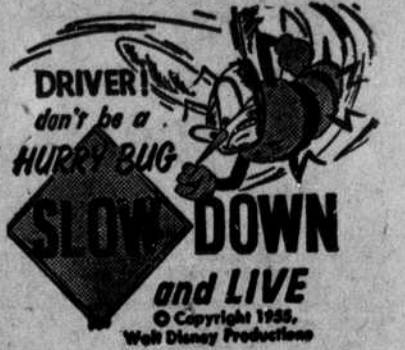
