The circle voted to hold monthly meetings at 7:30 p. m. instead of the regular 8 o'clock meeting time, and was invited to meet at

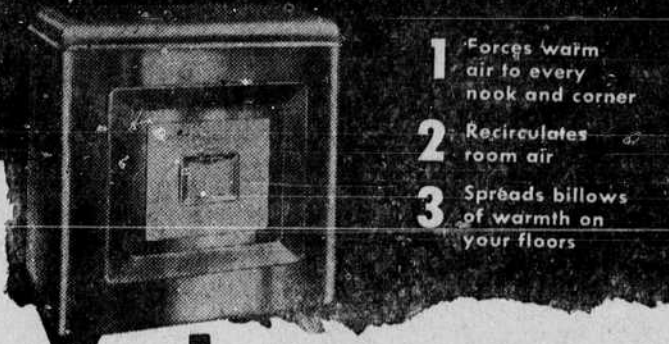
the home of Mrs. George Bialock in October.
