Already under construction is a second two-lane strip from Archdale Farms to the north city limits of Grover, and Mr. Kemper said he had hopes that the state highway commission will allot sufficient funds to provide for an additional two-lane strip on the 4.7 miles between Archdale Farms and the Richard Owens farm.

The problem of continuing the four-lane road through Grover remains, Mr. Kemper said, the Town of Grover declining to accept responsibility for iurnishing one-third of the right-of-way cost, which Mayor C. F. Harry has said that Grover cannot afford. Grover could unincorporate the portion of the town effected, but the action would require legislation by the General Assembly, next scheduled to convene in 1957.


