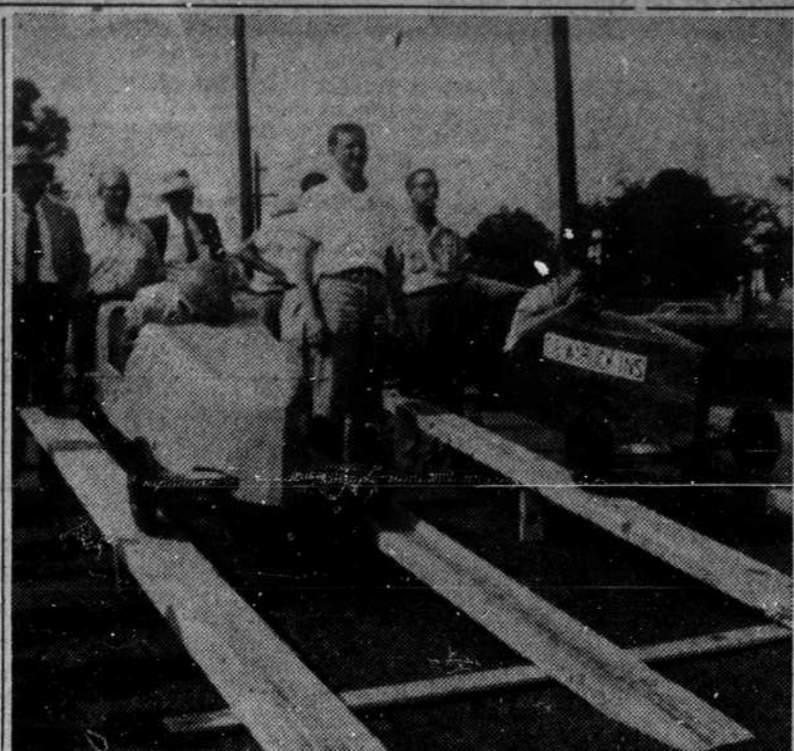

This machine is now making about 9,000 X-rays per year, free of charge; Sponsoring TB Christmas seal sale in an effort to reach county goal of \$10,000; Sponsored Religion in American Life program—a 5 week—Go to Church program which was very successful; Sponsored a float in local Christmas Parade with a theme "Put Christ back in Christmas;" In co-operation with the American Legion and the K. Listing Chore Is Half-Complete

City and county tax listing are proceeding at a better-than-usual pace, Listing Officials Conrad Hughes and C. E. Carpenter agreed Wednesday, but the pace is slightly behind the calendar.

Estimate was that only about 50 percent of the listing chore is complete, with more than half the listing period passed.

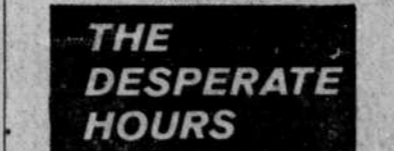

Driver Is Uninjured As Truck Overturns

A tractor-trailer loaded with barrels of liquid latex overturned about three miles from Kings Mountain on the Gastonia-Kings Mountain highway Wednesday morning when a tire blew out.

The driver, J. Hugh Bartley, 21, escaped without injury, according to Gaston County Sheriff department deputies, who investigated the accident.

Bartley told the officers that he was traveling about 45 miles per hour when the tire went down causing his rig to go out of control and overturn.

The whitish liquid latex spilled out of the trailer, but very little of it got on the pavement, the officers added.

The truck, owned by General Latex and Chemical Company of Georgia, was headed north at the time of the accident.

Martin was also arrested and charged with driving while drunk.

The accident occurred, police stated, when the 1950 Studebaker occupied by Mr. and Mrs. Howell was struck in the back by the 1950 Ford driven by Martin. The Howell vehicle had stopped for a traffic signal, police reported.

Trial for Martin who made bond of \$200, has been scheduled for City Recorder's court February 6.

Herald's Hagood History Erroneous

The Herald's history department was termed in error last week in its account of the fire which leveled the Plonk-Baker dwelling known as the Hagood Place.

W. D. Weaver, longtime citizen, writes: "The Hagood Place that was recently burned was built by Mr. Hagood in 1900. He was secretary at the Lula Mill which began operation in 1901.

"Mr. I. Boyce Falls bought the place in 1904 and sold his place to Mr. G. D. Hambright on Railroad Avenue, near the Oil Mill. Mr. Falls later bought where the A&P now
