Senator Morgan was introduced to the club by First Vice-President Harold Coggins, who gave a little of the background on the school problem and the calling of the special legislative session by Governor Hodges, President B. S. Peeler, Jr., presided over the business portion of the meeting.

Mr. Carlton reported that Recreation Baseball League cost a total of \$1248 to operate, but pointed out that he had raised \$1272 for this league through donations.

The Slo-pitch softball league was conducted at a cost of just \$5.95 to the Recreation Commission. This money was used to buy a trophy for the league champion.

Deal street pool receipts through last Thursday totaled \$2363, Mr. Carlton reported. This represented an average daily total of \$26.95 for the 11-week period. However, Mr. Carlton added that the daily payroll at Deal street pool was \$21, leaving a little over \$5 per day to pay for lights, water, chemicals and other supplies.

The City Board of Commissioners agreed at its last meeting to "write-off" all back water and light bills charged to the Recreation Commission.

One phase of Mr. Carlton's report was of great concern to the present commission, Carlton reported that the average weekly income of the Negro swimming pool was \$35-\$40, while salaries at the pool were costing the city some \$60 per week.

Members expressed much concern with this picture, and discussed means by which attendance at the Negro pool could be increased.

The commission members were split on one issue—that of what should come first—a fulltime recreation director or additional recreation facilities. Each of these items will depend upon the financial condition of the recreation program.

The possibility of establishing a winter recreation program was also discussed, but no action was taken by the commission.

Dr. Gerberding closed the initial session by asking that each member of the commission prepare a sample budget and list of recreational needs to be taken up at the next meeting.

Dean Payne, Jaycee representative, moved that Fred Plonk be appointed senior advisor for the commission. This did not come to a vote, and no action was taken.
