Patrolmen Are Not Assigned To Vote April 17; Rules Listed

Bethware school district patrons will vote next Wednesday afternoon on the question of abandoning the so-called "split" term, which has long been in vogue at Bethware and majority of other county schools. Also voting on the question the

same day will be patrons of Lattimore and Number 3 schools in the county system. On recent petition, Boiling Springs school will vote on the question in May.

The voting will be conducted from 1 to 6 p. m. April 17 at both Bethware and Platterson Grove schools.

Rules of voting procedure adopted by the county board of school commissioners provide that patrons will be allowed one vote per student, grades one through 11. Seniors will not provide their parents a vote. Either parent may cast the votes for all children in the family.

The result shall be determined on basis of majority of the votes

Currently, Bethware and other county schools hold a six . week summer session, then suspend sessions during the autumn harvest season

Some three years ago Bethware patrons soundly defeated a proposal to eliminate the split term

Prospects, some Bethware patrons report, are that the split term will be voted out at next Wednesday's election. These patrons say numerous patrons have changed their position on the issue, with the cut in cotton acreage and advent of soil . banking having eliminated one of the major reasons for using the split

Man Caught After Chase

Three charges are scheduled to be heard in City Recorder's court Monday afternoon against Reidsville automobile driver who led police on a 100-mile-per-hour chase Monday afternoon.

Reckless driving and speeding 75-miles-per-hour were placed a gainst Amos Turner Burton, 32, by Kings Mountain Police Department when the chase finally ended Monday afternoon on West Franklin avenue, Gastonia. A third charge, assault with a deadly weapon, was also placed against Burton by State Highway Patrolman B. R. Lyerly.

Burton was given an active sentence Wednesday morning in Gastonia court on charges of assault with a deadly weapon (the car), hit-and-run driving, reckless driving, and speeding, which grew out of the same in cident

The 100 - mile - per . hour chase began Monday afternoon when State Patrolman Lyerly spotted Burton speeding on Kings Mountain highway. Patrolman yerly chased the car into Kings Mountain, down East King street, and finally into Carpenter street, which was blocked by a closed gate. Lyerly stated he left his car to make the arrest and Burton threatened him with a monkey wrench. The patrolman stated he re-entered his car to ask for help. Burton re-entered his car, and headed back north on Carpenter street.

Meanwhile, City Policeman Paul Saunders said, he and Policeman Tom Gladden were cruising on East King street, noticed the commotion and realized Burton was trying to escape. The city officers blocked the Carpenter street entrance. As Burton, Officer Sanders stated, approached the roadblock, he veered his car to the right, cutting across the lawn of L. P. Stowe's residence, and back into East King street.
