Kings Mountain's long safety record without a traffic fatality was broken Wednesday morning when Dorus Bess, 45-year-old Negro, was killed in the collision of a Roadway Express truck

It had been 2,044 days since a person died within the city li-mits as a result of a traffic ac-

Three other men were injured in the wreck which occurred about 7:30 a. m. at the intersection of West King and Watterson streets. The Negro man died

Headed west on West King street, the truck reportedly struck the 1950 Dodge on the car's left side near the rear door before spinning the car around, sending the car 51 feet on the sidewalk.
