

Thirty-Three Killed In War Against Dogs

"No prisoners are taken, shoot the enemy on sight," is the attitude of the Kings Mountain Police Department in their allout war against Kings Mountain's stray dog populace.

City policemen added some 28 to the fallen ranks of dogs last week, making the total toll 33 during the first two weeks of the 30-day dog quarantine in No. 4 Township.

The stray dogs are enemies to public health in Kings Mountain, their masses provide favorable conditions for the contraction and spread of the dread disease of rabies.

No cases have been reported thus far, but the quarantine will continue through October All No. 4 Township owners
