Girl Scout Worker To Attend Meeting

Miss Cordia Legretta Hoffman, field director for the Pioneer Girl Scout Council, will attend an initial training course "Job of the Field Director" at the Twin Pine Lodge, Stroudsburg, Pa., October 27-November 8.

Miss Hoffman will leave on October 6 for Chapel Hill to attend an "Orientation" course for three days which is a pre-requisite course before going to Stroudsburg. While in Pennsylvania, the worker will also attend the Association of Girl Scout Professional Workers convention in Philadelphia on November 8-10. "Life, Liberty and Pursuit of Happiness" is the theme, and quite appropriate for the setting. The course "Job of the Field Director" required for new professional workers employed by a Girl Scout Council is designed in helping the council develop and maintain program of good quality. Consideration of the Girl Scout program and of the leaders work with troops, use and development of troop and intertroop program in camp and city-wide settings, ways of learning what is happening in troops, how boards and committees use program information in their work, and the role of the professional worker in helping the neighborhood service team are all a part of the training.

Miss Hoffman, formerly community worker for the Pioneer Council, joined the staff in September, 1956. She graduated from the Tennessee A & I State University, Nashville, in May, 1956. She is a native of Dallas, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. R. Hoffman.

A black dress with matching bonnet, worn many years ago by the late Mrs. Henry King when she attended services in the old frame Methodist church, was modeled by Mrs. Saunders. Mrs. King was the mother of the late G. T. King and the dress is now the property of Mrs. G. W. King.

Mrs. Bun Goforth modeled a dress which was part of the trousseau of Mrs. W. C. Putnam and made by her mother, Mrs. Daniel Fulton.

Mrs. David Hamrick, in a dress once worn by the late Mrs. Charles Murphey, mother of Mrs. Luther Cansler, and Mrs. C. A. Butterworth, wearing a dress formerly worn by the late Mrs. Jerome Harmon, sang at intervals during the show such numbers as "Believe Me Of All Those Endearing Young Charms", "Drink To Me Only With Thine Eyes", and "When You And I Were Young Maggie."

As a grand finale, Mrs. Trott and Mrs. Throneburg did some fancy steps which could well have been a cross between "Turkey Trot" and "The Charleston." They were dresses once worn by Mrs. Don Blanton, one of which Mrs. Blanton purchased in Paris during a visit there.

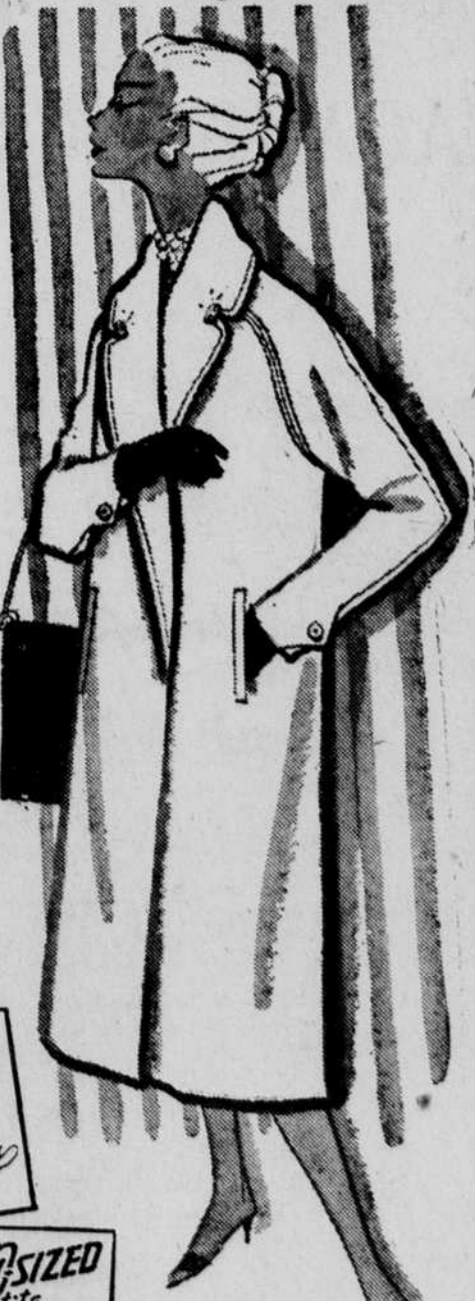
Thirty-five class members and two guests enjoyed the evening's festivities.
