### 307 In Schools Of City Haven't **Had Vaccine**

A total of 307 city schools pupils have not received any Salk vaccine to immunize them against infantile paralysis, Dr. Z. P. Mitchell, county health officer said Wednesday.

Another 315 of the more than 2000 pupils have either had one or two Salk "shots", but not the complete set of three,

"These children should be immunized and they can get the vaccine for nothing," Dr. Mitchell said. "We and the state have Salk vaccine going begging and, un-less it is used, it is going to die on our hands."

Dr. Mitchell explained that an. ti-polic vaccine has a limited life. He examined the expiration label on the Cleveland County health office supply and noted it


