



Foote-Union NLRB Hearing Scheduled

Labor Board **To Consider Union Petition**

The National Labor Relations Board has scheduled a hearing in Charlotte November 27, on the contention by a labor union that it represents a majority of Foote Mineral Company's Kings Mountain employees.

Neil Johnson, general manager of Foote's Kings Mountain ope. rations, said his company had been notified the hearing will be held at the post office building.

The hearing was necessitated when Foote denied the contention of the AFL-CIO United Cement, ime and Gympsum Workers.

According to past pattern, the hearing will be devoted to arguments by both company and union concerning the union claim of majority representation, identity of employees eligible for union membership, and will result in the ordering of an NLRB elect.
