

First Baptist church members were likely to decide in congregational meeting Wednesday night to retain legal counsel to represent the majority opinion of the church in litigation begun last Friday by the group oppos-ing abandonment of the present church plant.

Yates Harbison, chairman of the First Baptist board of deacons, said the recent legal actions be summarized and added, "I feel sure recommendations will be made for appointment of a committee to retain legal coun-

Again, Mr. Harbison explained he spoke only as a member of the church with one vote. Individuals among the new-church-on-a-newsite majority have discussed the legal situation with attorneys, but they were not speaking in behalf of the church, nor could they without a church vote of approval, Mr. Harbison pointed out.
