

be reduced. There would be no trouble in reaching centers. In the small schools over the county it is impossible to do good teaching. Each teacher has too many different classes of subjects to teach and in addition to this too many activities to do their best work. No teacher can make five or six preparations daily to teach and his job is defeated before it begins. It cannot be well done.

The large school as proposed would have enough pupils in each grade to have 3 or 4 teachers for each subject in every high school grade. For example the ninth grade English would have three or four teachers, each teaching ninth grade English all day. One would have a group of
