### Lowery Hasn't Called Meeting, **Denies Switch**

BY MARTIN HARMON Hill Lowery, chairman of the Bethware school committee, said Wednesday he has not yet called a meeting of the several Number 4 Township school committee chairmen, the group which has the task of carving a political arrangement for a merger of the township and city schools.

Mr. Lowery also declined to say when he would summon the group together, noting that the Beth-ware committee meets this week and that he expects to see the op-ening game of the Legion Junior Baseball season here Friday night. Indication was that he will call no meeting before next week.

Mr. Lowery did tell the Herald Wednesday that assumption by some citizens that he had chang ed position from favoring to opposing the proposed schools mer-ger has no basis in fact. "I haven't switched," Mr. Low-

ery said. "I never did say I favor-ed a merger without reserva-

Several proposals are being discussed for a political system which will be suitable to all of the schools which would be effected by the merger. These include, in addition to Klings Mountain city schools, Park Grace, Grover, Bethware and Compact in the county system.

One group favors expansion of the present Kings Mountain board of education to seven mem-bers, with two to be added from

the present county school area. Supt. B. N. Barnes, of the city system, has suggested a seven-man board with two to be elected

from the present city district, two from the present county district, and three to be elected at large.

Dr. P. G. Padgett, member of the city board of education, suggests a seven-man board, with three from what its now the Kings. Mounitain district and four from what is now in the county district.

Eugene Patterson, recently re-tired member of the Bethware committee, commented Monday, "I see no need to largue about representation. I'm interested in tter schools, not representa-

The merger contemplates even-tual construction of a new consolidated township high school, which school officials say can be had within three to four years, provided funds are provided.
