

Minette Fourth In Softball Loop

Like the Yankees, Minette Mills defending state softball champions are off to a slow start this season.

The Minette-men are in fourth place in the fast South Atlantic Softball League this summer with a record of four wins and six losses in league competition.

Champion Y paces the circuit with a 5-1 record, followed by Atlanta, Ga., with a 5-3 mark, and McLean-Whitney of Winston Salem, 3-3. Minette's 4-6 leads the second division, trailed by Knoxville, Tenn., 3-5, and Hendersonville 2-4.

Gene Turner, Minette's all-state outfielder last season is in fifth place in the league's batting race with a .324 mark.

Holcomb of Champion Y leads the league with a 50.9 bat mark, followed by Colage akis with 45.0, and a pair of Atlanta players, Muse (.400) and Barnette (.333). Two other Minette players are among the top ten hitters in the loop, Dudson (.300) and Hickey (.288).

Wade Garrett of Champion Y and Brown of Atlanta lead the pitchers with three straight wins each.
