### No Opponents For Ellis, Sarratt

### **Filing Deadline** Passed; Other **Offices Contested**

County Commissioners J. Broadus Ellis and Knox Sarratt have

won Democratic renomination, the only two incumbents in country offices to own this distinction. Filing deadline passed at noon last Friday. Since neither has Republican opposition in the November election, their re-election

appears a formality.

Mr. Ellis, Grover businessman, is seeking his second term as District 2 commissioner. He defeated Carl Finger, Kings Mountain laundry man, in the 1958

race.
Finger was seeking his first full term, having been appointed District 2 commissioner at the death of Hazel Bumgardner. Mr. Sarratt is the eldest in-

cumbent commissioner in service and presently serves as chairman of the five-man board.

Other county commission posts are contested, District 1 being a three-way race between U. L. Patterson, Jr., William Hugh Dover, and Fred H. Grigg.
