The group met at Bonnie Mills Company office Wednesday mor-ning and W. K. Mauney, spokesman, said that considerable interest was expressed in the esablishment of a Union Trust branch here. He added that Union Trust Company's board of directors is to consider the invitation at a meeting next Tuesday.

Clyde L. Stutts, president of the Shelby bank, and J. O. Lutz, board chairman, declined comment other than to verify the fact that Kings Mountain citizens have asked Union Trust to consider seeking establishment of a Kings Mountain branch.
