

Two Undefeated Seasons In Span

The Mountaineers also claim another distinction in the six-year records, being the only team during the span with two undefeated seasons. Kings Mountain did not lose a Conference game in either of the league title years of '55 and '56, although having one tie each season.

Lincolnton this year and Forest City, also in 1955, are the only other Southwest Conference teams to post undefeated marks for a single season. Forest City and KM tied for the top in '55, with the Mountaineers winning the playoff game.
